LAWRENCE BUREAU HOLDS MEETINGS

(From the Joplin Globe.) Meetings under auspices of the Lawrence County Farm Bureau have been held in many places over the country during the last few days. J. Kelly Wright and Sam Jordan, lecturer for the Missouri State Board of Agriculture, have been the principal speakers.

The membership of the bureau now numbers more than 400 and it is planned to continue the drive after January 1 in a local way in the expectation of enrolling 500 members by that time and then employ a county agent. The agent's employment will be discussed at a meeting January 3, Edward Wild, president, said yesterday.

A meeting was held yesterday at Hoberg in which Mr. Jordan was the principal speaker. He spoke at Peirce City Wednesday and several new members were enrolled, many of them persons who had not understood the purposes of the farm bureau. Mr. Wright spoke earlier in the week at Verona, Freistatt, Mount Vernon and other towns in the county. The farm bureau is co-operating with a local organization in the county and the two forces are considering establishing an exchange for farmers in Peirce City. They may embark in the elevator business there. In case this is determined upon favorably by the members of that section of the country it is probable that an elevator situated in Peirce City now owned by farmers will be purchased, providing its present owners are willing to sell.
