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## ROAD BILLS BEFORE STATE SENATE

Measure Submitted to Cut State Income and Corporation Taxes and Regulate Clerical Force.

Jefferson City, Mo., June 15.—Fifteen bills were introduced in the senate at today's session of that body. Seven of the measures were introduced by Senator Proctor of Kansas City. Five of them deal with road legislation and are intended to make effective the \$60,000,000 road program authorized by the voters of the state at the last general election. It was to work out the road program that the legislature is meeting in special session. Among the bills introduced today are the following:

By Gray of Jasper: Reducing the state income tax from 1 1/2 per cent to 1 per cent.

By Pickett of Grady: Reducing the state income tax from 1 1/2 per cent to 1 per cent and increasing the exemption for married persons from \$2,000 to \$3,000.

By Young of Caldwell: Reducing the state tax levy to eight cents on the one hundred dollars valuation.

By Irwin of Cole: Reducing the corporation franchise tax from \$1 on the \$1,000 valuation to 50 cents.

A bill by Senator Proctor would reduce the corporation tax rate one-half and in addition allow exemptions for liabilities. The senate committee on clerical hire submitted a report providing for 36 secretaries at \$3.50 and 38 clerks at the same cost in addition to the regular officers and bringing the total number of employees to 91. The body adopted the report without debate.
