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PROPOSALS VOTED ON ALL CARRY

Returns Indicate That Women's Equal Rights Measure Received Smallest Margin.

St. Louis, Aug. 3.—Returns compiled by a local newspaper covering slightly more than half of the anticipated vote of 250,000 in yesterday's special state wide election, indicate the adoption of the three constitutional amendments and the proposal for a constitutional convention. Included in these returns are the complete vote from St. Louis and Kansas City.

The amendment for a \$15,000,000 bond issue for a soldier bonus, that allowing use of automobile license fees for payment of interest on the \$60,000,000 road improvement bond issue and the constitutional convention proposal were given large majorities in the reported vote, ranging upward from 61,000.

While the amendment permitting women to hold all state offices received the smallest majority—slightly over 13,000 a sharp reversal of the trend shown by the available returns would be required to defeat it.

The vote so far compiled shows: For a constitutional convention, 98,864; against, 37,610.

Amendment No. 1 (Women)—Yes, 73,585; No, 60,302.

Amendment No. 2 (Roads)—Yes, 107,404; No, 22,002.

Amendment No. 3 (Bonus)—Yes, 106,500; No, 30,601.

RAIL WORKERS WANT ANSWER

Executives Will Submit Statement To Four Brotherhoods Some Time Next Week.

New York, Aug. 3.—The attitude of the big eastern railroads toward further wage decreases and the elimination of time and a half for overtime for engine, train and yard service workers will be communicated to the four big railroad brotherhoods and the Switchmen's Union of North America next week. This was announced tonight following a conference here tonight between a committee of the railroad executives of the eastern presidents conference and the heads of the railroad organizations concerned. Until the conference has taken final action it is understood the making of agreements under the recent awards of the labor board reducing wages 12 per cent, effective July 1, will be held in obedience. The union chiefs today asked the attitude of the railroads on the following questions:

"If the operating officials of the railroads will reduce the wage rates in effect on June 30, 1921?"

"If all demands for further decreases will be withdrawn?"

"If all demands for the elimination of time and one-half for overtime and radical schedule revision will be withdrawn and not pressed again for a stated period?"

After hearing the arguments presented by the labor men in behalf of their requests, the railroad executives informed them they would make a report to the presidents' conference which will take final action. The conference will meet next week.

Warren S. Stone, chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, who headed the union delegation, declined to make any statement. He was accompanied by L. E. Sheppard of the Order of Railway Conductors; W. S. Carter of the Firemen and Engine-men, and James Murdock, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

The railroad executive committee was headed by E. E. Loomis, president of the Lehigh Valley; W. W. Atterbury, vice-president of the Pennsylvania railroad; E. N. Brown, chairman of the Pere Marquette railroad, and Percy R. Todd, president of the Bangor and Aroostook railroad.

BARRY COUNTY BRIDGE PROPOSITION DEFEATED

The Barry county election returns, so far as they have been counted, show that the proposition to build a bridge over White river near Golden, was defeated.

A peculiar circumstance shown by the vote is that some of the precincts in the north part of the county voted favorable for the bridge levy, while townships in the south part of the county, who would receive a greater benefit, voted it down.

Cassville voted 465 for and 28 against; Monett 308 for and 188 against; Kings Prairie No. 1, 27 for and 6 against. Seligman, Washburn, Purdy, Eagle Rock and Wheaton voted strong against the levy.
