

JASPER COUNTY'S EXHIBIT WINS

Is Awarded First Place at State Fair With Total of 2,050 Out of Possible 2,200 Points.

Sedalia, Mo., August 9.—Jasper county's farm bureau exhibit at the centennial exposition and state fair was today awarded first place by the judges who judged the display with a score card system.

Out of a possible 2,200 points, Jasper county rolled up the astounding total of 2,050. The next nearest competitor was Atchison county, with a score of 1,946.

J. H. H. Mote, county agricultural agent, who accompanied the display here and superintended its arrangement, was aided both in collecting the farm products and in their arrangements by A. Fennimore, president; F. F. Ross, secretary-treasurer and W. T. Montgomery, a member of the Jasper county farm bureau.

In addition, more than a score of Jasper county farmers aided in the work here.

Other leading counties and their scores, in addition to Jasper and Atchison, were: Johnson, 1,939; St. Francis, 1,862; Saline, 1,859; Stoddard, 1,854; Lafayette, 1,823; Perry, 1,598.

NOTICE ALL EX-SERVICE MEN

The Director of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance has instituted a campaign to "clean-up" cases of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance by actual contact with the disabled men themselves.

The purpose of this campaign is to fully advise all ex-service persons of their rights under the War Risk Insurance act; to assist the disabled ex-service persons in securing compensation, medical treatment and hospital care; to inform and assist all claimants regarding the procedure necessary in filing a claim for compensation and insurance; to assist those whose claims are pending in securing final action where additional evidence is necessary to connect their disability with service, or other data required by the Bureau of War Risk Insurance; and to provide for immediate physical examination where necessary and promptly furnish hospitalization for urgent cases.

A squad of representatives of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance will be in Springfield August 25 and 26 and in Joplin August 23 and 24.
