**NOTICE ALL EX-SERVICE MEN**

The Director of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance has instituted a campaign to "clean-up" cases of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance by actual contact with the disabled men themselves.

The purpose of this campaign is to fully advise all ex-service persons of their rights under the War Risk Insurance act; to assist the disabled ex-service persons in securing compensation, medical treatment and hospital care; to inform and assist all claimants regarding the procedure necessary in filling a claim for compensation and insurance; to assist those whose claims are pending in securing final action where additional evidence is necessary to connect their disability with service, or other data required by the Bureau of War Risk Insurance; and to provide for immediate physical examination where necessary and promptly furnish hospitalization for urgent cases.

A squad of representatives of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance will be in Springfield August 25 and 26 and in Joplin August 23 and 24.
