NEW SHAFT TO BE STARTED AT COAL MINE

The top of the coal mine on the Medlin land caved in recently as the men were trying to clean out the lower drift. So much dirt fell that they decided it would be easier to sink a new shaft than to clean out the old one.

The Monett Coal Company is advertising for bids for sinking of the new shaft, which will be about 500 yards from the old one. The new shaft will be sunk sixty-five feet or deeper, according to that prospect they find. The mine had been worked a little when first discovered and the company was opening up the old drifts to see if coal was there in paying quantities. They had cleaned the shaft out to the lower drift. There they found that it had been timbered up, but that the dirt had sifted through until it was completely filled. They were trying to remove this dirt when the cave-in occurred.
