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## VATICAN IS READY FOR PAPAL ELECTION

Cardinals Enter Seclusion for Sessions Beginning Wednesday to Elect New Pope.

Rome, Feb. 1.—The cardinals comprising the sacred college are entering into seclusion this evening for the conclave to elect a successor to Benedict XV, the sessions of which begin tomorrow. It is the opinion in vatican circles that the conclave will be short and that the next pope will be chosen from among the moderates.

By those in close touch with the preliminary proceedings it is declared that neither the so-called "irreconcilables" nor those constituting the "peace party" will have a chance to elect their candidate without the assistance of the moderates. The five French cardinals are said to favor the continuance of the policy of the late pope and will vote for a cardinal of the moderate group.

The other foreign cardinals generally are understood not to desire to join either side among the Italians, and will vote for a moderate.

Throughout the day supplies of food had been stored within the vatican, sufficient to last 350 persons during "a seven days' siege," according to the expression of one of the vatican attendants.

Besides one secretary and one servant each for the fifty-two cardinals who will compose the conclave on the first day, there will be within the vatican, after the doors are boited, a general secretary of the conclave, Monsignor Sincero; one sacristan and assistant; eleven cooks, who will be Sisters of Charity; three doctors, including Dr. Battistini, who attended Benedict in his last illness; five pharmacists, seven masters of ceremony, two vote takers, nine janitors, one architect, three firemen, two night watchmen, one carpenter, a bricklayer, a plasterer, a blacksmith, an electrician, two plumbers, three barbers and nine waiters.

## AGRICULTURAL TWO DAY COURSE AT CASSVILLE

A two days Agricultural course and community meeting will be held at Cassville on Monday and Tuesday, March 6 and 7. Final decision in the matter was reached at the conference of farmers and business men held Monday afternoon at the courthouse when the plans for the course were explained by H. J. Nagorsen of Chicago and D. R. Reynolds of Springfield.

Prof. P. G. Holden, formerly of the Iowa Agricultural college at Ames, but now in charge of the Agricultural Extension department work for the International Harvester Co., will have charge and be the director of the short course. He will be assisted by R. R. Robertson, an authority on horticultural subjects, and Miss Zella Wigent who will conduct the women's school sessions.

Only six towns in the Ozark section have succeeded in landing these short courses this season. The towns were selected by the interest manifested in trying to secure the course. The towns getting the courses are: Greenfield, Bolivar, Ozark, Mountain Grove, Cassville and Rogers.

This short course is educational and is really a farm and community interest institute which should prove to be the biggest event the community has ever had of its kind. Watch for the advertising matter which is to be sent out telling all about the course.

W. T. Ayres, Manager of the Exchange at Cassville, was elected Executive and the various committees are to be named at a meeting to be held tonight, Wednesday, at 7:30 o'clock at the courthouse.

Cassville and community landed this short course because the citizens here assured the directors of the work that we would "put it over." Now it is up to every citizen of the county interested in this work to be a real booster and assist in making it a success.

## NO TRACE FOUND OF 6 ESCAPED PRISONERS

Reward of \$25 Is Offered By Sheriff For Each—Search Is Continued.

Neosho, Mo., Feb. 1.—Sheriff Geo. Yadon of Newton County today offered \$25 reward for the arrest of each of six prisoners who escaped from the county jail here last night. The sheriff and his deputies continued their search for the fugitives but found no trace of them. Inquiries in the surrounding district failed to bring to light information regarding the course of the fugitives took in their flight.

The escape was made about 6:30 o'clock last night, while twelve prisoners were assembled in the ring cell on the first floor for dinner. Three iron bars were sawed from a window. The jail delivery was discovered about 7 o'clock when the jailer returned to lock the prisoners in their cells for the night. He found six prisoners who refused to take advantage of the opportunity to gain their liberty.

Those who escaped are: R. J. Perry 24; Tom Moore, 50; Lawrence Doid, 22; Paul Jones, 22; Wallace Lancaster, 25 to 28 years old.
