**MRS. J. C. LEAKE DIES**

AFTER OPERATION

Mrs. J. C. Leake died at St. Johns hospital in Springfield at 11 o'clock Saturday night, following an operation for gall stones, which was performed Thursday afternoon. The gall bladder had abscessed and gangrene set in, which caused her death. The body was brought to her home at Monett Sunday.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church Monday afternoon, conducted by the pastor, Rev. C. F. Whitlock, who spoke a touching eulogy over the body of Mrs. Leake, who was one of his most faithful members.

Mrs. Leake was a good Christian woman, firm in her convictions of right and conscientious in the performance of her Christian duty. She was a kind, charitable woman, whose death is universally mourned.

Mary Catherine Miller was born August 19th, 1868 at Dixon, Mo., and died May 20, 1922 at St. John's hospital in Springfield, Mo., age 53 years.

On August 17, 1884 she was united in marriage with James C. Leake. In 1888 they moved to Monett, where they have since resided. To this union five children were born, Charlie, who died in 1903, Hattie, who died in 1909, and Arthur Leake, of St. Louis, Mrs. Naomi Gentry, of Eldorado, Kan., and James Leake, Jr., who lives at home. Besides the three children she is survived by her husband, J. C. Leake, sister, Mrs. Margaret E. Eaton, of St. Louis and two grandchildren, Richard Jay and Mary Joan Gentry.

Mrs. Leake was converted in the Major Penn revival meeting in 1893 and united with the Baptist church. At the time of her death she was one of the most active, consecrated and beloved members of the First Baptist church of Monett.

Those from out of town who came to attend the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Jay J. Gentry and two children, of Eldorado, Kansas, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Leake, of St. Louis and Joe Dake, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Leake, of Waynesville, Mo.

**ANOTHER SUSPECT HELD IN PAYROLL ROBBERY**

Springfield, May 21.—John Bessy, alias John Stewart, who was arrested at Jefferson City Thursday on suspicion of being one of the bandits who Monday escaped with \$20,500 on Boonville avenue, was identified by several men on the route from Eldon to Lebanon last night as being one of the bandits, despite his claim that he is a whiskey runner. Stewart, or Bessy, is in the custody of Sheriff Jeff Harris, who lodged him late last night in the county jail at Lebanon. Harris will bring him here Monday.

The men who said they were positive that the prisoner is one of the bandits said also that he was one of the two who sat in the front seat of the bandit car on its mad rush north from Springfield, Monday.

The prisoner, who was delivered to Harris at Eldon by the Jefferson City authorities, is about 28 years old, weighs about 165 pounds and is 5 feet 10 inches tall. He is said to have boarded a Missouri Pacific train at Bagnell after he claimed he had been released by the Eldon authorities for bootlegging.

Harris was conducting an investigation at Lebanon last night and in the meantime had placed his captive in the Lebanon jail. He will bring the captive to Springfield today or Monday.
