## RAIL PARLEY CALL SENT OUT

Immediate Meeting of Policy Committee of Ninety Will Be Held.

Chicago, Sept. 6.—A call for an immediate meeting of the policy committee of ninety in Chicago, probably on Monday, was sent out tonight by John Scott, secretary of the striking railway shop crafts unions.

The telegraphic appeal was in code and was addressed to the regional general chairmen of the organization in all parts of the country. It was expected that it would arrive in Chicago and for that reason no general sessions were expected before the first of next week.

The secretary was called, it was intimated, to consider plans for a settlement of the strike on separate roads representing about one-third of the country's mileage. It followed reports of conferences between B. M. Jewell, head of the strikers and rail executives in the east.
