**MANLOVE DEFEATS LEE 3,647 VOTES**

Joplin, November 10.—Joe J. Manlove, republican, won the race for representative in congress from the Fifteenth congressional district by a plurality of 3,647 votes, according to complete unofficial returns from precincts in all seven counties. The defeated candidate, Frank H. Lee, democrat carried only two of the seven counties, Barry and Vernon.

Manlove received a total vote of 32,200 and Lee was given 28,553.
