

HOUSE MAY ADOPT SUBSIDY ACT

Harding Advised, However, That Measure Has No Chance in Senate.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Belief that some Republican irregulars from the central and western states may absent themselves when a vote is taken on the administration subsidy bill rather than go against the president, today increased the confidence of Republican leaders that the measure will go through the house when the show-down comes next Wednesday.

However, regardless of whether any of the western members are present, leaders claim they have a majority in sight. They admitted it would be a slim majority, however. Senate leaders today advised the president that his subsidy bill had little chance in the senate and advised him not to push it.

CROSS POLINATION OF CONCORD GRAPES

By James Doyle. To the Editor of Monett Times.

In the press reports of the many meetings held in Monett and surrounding districts for the increasing of the grape acreage in this section, and also on the care, cultivation and pruning of the vineyard, the most important and far reaching point in my estimation so far as successful grape growing is concerned has never been touched upon.

The setting out of a vineyard is an altogether difficult and more important affair than setting out a strawberry field, if we make a mistake in the setting out of a strawberry patch it can be remedied, if we profit any by experience, in the following year or so, the planting of a vineyard if good care and attention is given, is permanent, more so than even an orchard and should not be entered into until we are fully acquainted with some of the more important points that enter into successful and profitable grape culture.

I have found out by observation and experience the Concord is not all that might be desired in productiveness and size, and quality of bunch, but it can be greatly improved by cross-pollination with some strong pollen bearing variety of the same blooming period, at least I have found it so, although contrary to some of our grape specialists belief.

I have a letter from one of the leading grape authorities of New York state touching on this point, in which he says, "Concords have been found in a normal season to be 60 per cent self fertile, and can be materially improved in productiveness by the variety you (me) are using, and by other strong pollen bearing varieties" of the same blooming period.

If the Concord is, in a normal year only 60 per cent self fertile, and this agrees with my observation, it certainly leaves a wide field for investigation and improvement and one I think that should engage the attention of some of our grape experts, and boosters just as much, and more than increasing the acreage. Let them get busy, there is a great deal to be learned here if we are to succeed in this a mans sized job.

I am setting out 5 acres Concords and every 10th row transversely, will be a variety much better in quality and productiveness than Concord, to be used for cross pollination purposes. Am setting at such distances apart as will give me the same number of Concord vines as if set 8 by 10 feet and in addition will have 10 per cent or 60 vines per acre for other market purposes.

GRAND JURY RETURNS THIRTEEN INDICTMENTS

After a session of eight days the Grand Jury adjourned last Tuesday afternoon. The report of the investigation and findings of the jury was made to Judge Charles L. Henson and the jury was discharged. The jury was complimented very highly by Judge Henson for the splendid work they have done.

According to their report they found thirteen true bills and investigated a great number of complaints of boot-legging, possessing, selling and giving away whiskey. The report states that some people seem to think that the Grand Jury is composed of Sherlock Holmes' and should be able to ferret out almost anything, but they say such is not the case.

Three arrests have been made since the indictments have been turned in. They are: George and James May on a charge of selling whiskey and Wm. Rowley on a charge of violating a second time.

In their report the Grand Jury recommends several changes should be made at county farm. They visited the county jail and found conditions there to be very good. They recommend a secure place for the storage of evidence being held by the Sheriff and Prosecuting Attorney as they find that such evidence has been destroyed at different times.

According to their report the books and records of the county officials from a superficial examination appear to be kept in proper order. They recommend that an auditor should be employed the first of each year to check each office to ascertain whether or not any errors or irregularities exist.—Cassville Democrat.

Cancer sufferers who have been advised to have surgical operations will be interested in the remarkable recovery of J. N. Hodson, Unionville, Mo., who for seven years had a cancer on his left cheek.
