A REVIEW OF THE OZARK PLAYGROUND ACTIVITIES

John F. Potts, secretary of the Ozark Playgrounds Association, sends in a report of the results of the playgrounds movement the past year as follows:

December is a good month to review the results of the Ozark Playgrounds Association,—the Community effort of the twelve Counties of Southern Missouri and Northern Arkansas, which has produced and stabilized this new business,—The Tourist Corp.

For your convenience, also of great interest to your readers, we have prepared the following high points:

Average number of car loads of tourists, stopping at the Tourist Bureau, daily, during the season, 70.

Total number of motor cars into region, from all Gateways, 25,000,—approximately 5 persons in each car.

Total number of persons entering the region by train, for pleasure purposes, about 50,000.

Estimated number of people reached through Association Officials in personal talks, in Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, 50,000.

Total number of pieces of individual resort literature furnished the Bureau by resorts, distributed personally, 25,000.

Total number of Ozark booklets distributed by mail and persons 17,000. These booklets went into every State in the Union, and into some Foreign Countries.

Total number of personal calls at the Bureau, average per month for five months, 3,000,—5,500 in August.

Total number of official maps distributed at Bureau, average per month, 3,000.

Total number of telephone calls at the Bureau, average per month, 5,000.

Total number of pieces of first class mail, sent out from Tourists Bureau, average per month, 2,500.

Estimated number of tourists visiting region, 150,000.

Estimated amount of money spent by tourists, \$6,000,000.

You will notice that the Tourists Crop is rapidly becoming one of the principal crops. The year's results have fallen little short of wonderful, when we consider that the Association is purely a co-operative one, no Officials receiving any salary, except the Active Secretary and Assistant. Each tourist into the region, costs but twelve cents apiece. Your community dollars therefore, have been well spent.
