Cranberry Recipes.

There are more ways than one to prepare and serve cranberries. It is not at all necessary to wait until the holidays or until company comes when we may choose to serve cranberry jellies with turkey or chicken meat. Cranberries, when properly preserved or otherwise prepared, need no other accompaniment than a slice of buttered bread, a fresh biscuit, or a cruller.

Cranberries make nearly all meats doubly palatable, and are, in this season of the year, cheap, healthful, and delicious. Just to give a slight idea of the tempting dishes possible with cranberries on the menu, the following recipes are given:

Cranberry Sauce—One quart cranberries, one pound granulated sugar, and one pint of water. Boil sugar and water together five minutes, skim, add berries and cook slowly without stirring.

Cranberry Cottage Pudding—Two cups cranberries, one cup granulated sugar, one-half cup butter, one teaspoonful cream of tartar, one-half teaspoonful saleratus, one-half cup milk, two yolks of eggs and enough flour to make quite stiff. Bake in moderate oven about 30 minutes. To make the sauce for above pudding, dissolve one teaspoonful flour in cold water, add boiling water until thickens, stir in whites of two eggs and two-thirds cup granulated sugar and cook.

Cranberry Water Ice—One quart cranberries, and one pint of water. Boil until skins are soft. Strain through a colander or cheese cloth. When cool add juice of one or two lemons. Make a syrup of one pound granulated sugar and one-half pint water. When cool add to the above and freeze. This will serve six people.—Colman's Rural World.
