Speaking.

Thursday, Hons. Joseph W. Folk and R. F. Lozier of Carrollton were here to discuss the political issues. This they did very ably. Mr. Folk needs no introduction to a Monroe audience and made a splendid speech. Mr. Lozier was a stranger but he is known here now as a clear, forceful, logical speaker who knows much about the political questions which have in the past and which now confront the people Saturday we had splendid talks by Hon. J. P. Boyd and H. J. Blanton. These gentlemen ably discussed the questions of the hour.

Obituary.

George Alexander Hawkins was born July 4, 1848, at Frankford, Ky., and moved to Missouri in the year 1859 and located in this vicinity. He lived here for many years and then moved to Kansas City where he died at his home on Oct. 28, 1914.

He was married to Miss Eudora E Hayden on June 27, 1871. This union was blessed with ten children all of whom are living but one who died in infancy and beside whose little grave the father now lies in his last long sleep.

The deceased was a religious man and a member of the Christian church. He was the first one to unite with that church after its organization in this city in the year 1870. His was the first confession at the first meeting held in the newly organized church. He helped to build the first Christian church building and together with Benjamin F. Hickman remodeled the building in 1890. He held the office of Deacon in the church here almost continuously from the time he became a member until he moved his membership to Kansas City during the incumbency of the present minister.

Mr. Hawkins was a man who stood on the right side of every moral issue. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity. He became such in the year 1885. He was also an Odd Fellow. He became a member of that order in 1871 and was the first one to be initiated after the organization of the order in this city. He was a faithful member of each of these and of the church during his life time.

The funeral services were held at the Christian church here at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon, conducted by Rev. W. G. Alcorn assisted by Rev. Geo. A. Campbell of Hannibal. At the graveside the I. O. O. F. Lodge gave him burial according to its rites.

The deceased is survived by one sister, Mrs. Cora Umstatt of this city, his widow and nine children besides several grandchildren.

Cattle receipts have been light this week and all medium to good killing steers have advanced 15 to 25c. There have been very few good cattle here and nothing choice top being \$10.50 for four loads of 1475 pound cattle which we sold.

Bulk of the choice steers selling from \$9.65 to \$10.85. Good \$8.40 to 9.50. Medium \$7.50 to 8.25. Fair killers \$6.65 to 7.40.

Stockers and feeder market is demoralized on account of the yards being quarantined today and all cattle, hogs and sheep arriving here have to be sold for slaughter as they cannot go back to the country for feeding purposes. However do not think this quarantine will last many days, as there have been no sick cattle here, as it all started from the foot and mouth disease cattle in Chicago, and the whole state has been quarantined.

The Returns

Latest returns indicate that Sen. Stone was elected Tuesday by a large majority and the State ticket is safe. All the Constitutional Amendments were lost. May lose 2 or 3 congressmen in state.

Democratic majority in Congress greatly reduced. Think Senate and House will be Democratic.

At this time it is not possible to give anything definite.

It appears that Sullivan was defeated by Shearman for U. S. Senator from Illinois. Uncle Joe Cannon was returned to Congress.

Monroe City Vote.

At the election Tuesday only 353 votes were polled as against 504 two years ago. At that election Wilson received 377 votes. Tuesday Stone received 305 votes. Taft's vote was 93 two years ago and Tuesday Akins received only 35. Thus showing a greater decrease for Republicans than for Democrats. Sagar the Progressive received 8 votes and Green the Socialist 5 votes. Gass and Rucker lead the ticket here with 310 votes each. The County ticket was about the same as for State officers.
