Special Term of County Court. The county court held a special term last Saturday and disposed of following matters: James E. Farrow loaned \$1,000 from the school fund. Board of commissioners for the Irondale Special Road District appointed—C. W. Sloan to serve three years, J. D. Evans two years and Jonathan Wisdon one year. M. E. Rhodes and S. G. Nipper, special counsel for the county, allowed \$215 for services. John Hudson allowed \$78.99 for lumber furnished to county farm. John Turner appointed overseer for special road district No. 11. W. B. Compton and S. V. Eye allowed \$1.25 each for services in casting up vote in Irondale special road district election. Geo. W. Seabourne, W. B. Compton and S. V. Eye allowed \$5.00 each for one day's service as county judges.

A P. O. Scandal at Farmington. When Congressman W. L. Hensley hauled off with his good right hand in his office at Farmington on Monday morning of last week and landed on the jaw of Jim Watson, another leading citizen of that burg, he shook loose a postoffice scandal there that has the town seething with excitement. Last winter Congressman Hensley recommended B. L. Smith for the Farmington postmastership, who was later appointed. Recently rumors were wafted around that Smith had made a deal with Watson, who was a close friend of Hensley, for Watson's influence in bringing about the appointment, and that money had been paid by Smith to Watson on this account. When the rumor reached Mr. Hensley he called Postmaster Smith on the carpet and the latter admitted that he had promised Watson \$1,000 if he (Smith) received the appointment, to be paid in installments, and that he had paid over \$250. After paying that much, Smith, it appears, discovered that Watson had never used his influence with Hensley in the appointment, and refused to make further payments. When Hensley got the facts from Smith he was wroth, and on the Monday morning mentioned, when Watson entered Hensley's office to arrange a little business matter between themselves, he handed Watson one. It seems that Congressman Hensley is in no wise involved in the graft alleged to have been worked by Watson. He has made a full report of the matter and submitted it to the Postoffice authorities. The outcome of the matter may be that Smith will lose his position.
