He takes the dirt from around the roots in the fall, bends the trees over on the ground, and covers them with straw. He has now about twenty-five trees that he experimented on last fall, and they are filled with peaches, and these are the only trees in the county that have peaches on this season. That's the way they raise peaches up in Iowa.
