A. H. Hoagland, of New York City, has enclosed with \$50,000 a chain of Higher Physical Anthropology, College, Bellow Springs, N. Y.

It is announced at Antiochbarro that Master Workman Porderly has consented to run on the Democratic ticket for governor of Pennsylvania.

The political prohibitionists of Champaign, Stark and Franklin counties, Ohio, held conventions, Saturday, and nominated county tickets.

Glendon's servants are packing up his furniture, books and papers in his official residence in Downing street, London, preparatory to moving.

The new Parliament will probably be summoned to meet on August 5. It will then, it is believed, be adjourned to reassemble some time in October.

The fortification appropriation bill, which appropriates \$629,000 for armament and repairs of sea coast fortifications, has passed the house.

An unusually large death rate is reported in Chicago for the last week. The total mortality was 393. Of this number 229 were children under 5 years of age.

Advisers from Western Texas represent great losses of cattle. The drought has been unparalleled. A large section of country is like a desert, being without grass or water.

The queen dowager of Bavaria has ordered the construction at her own expense of a memorial chapel on the banks of Lake Starnberg, where King Ludwig was found.

Madagascar has granted an English company a charter to establish a royal bank, with power to coin money and issue bank notes. The bank will have a capital of \$2,000,000.

A late dispatch from Victoria, B. C., says it is reported that the town of Vancouver, B. C., is again in ashes. The telegraph office is destroyed, and no particulars can be obtained.

A Negro who attacked the Italian Minister at Terriers was tripped, tied to a donkey's tail, and led through the town, while two soldiers gave him 2,000 lashes with knotted ropes.

At a meeting held in the Public Square at Calicut, on Sunday afternoon, it was resolved to petition the government to take immediate steps for the expulsion of the Jesuits from Peru.

At a meeting of the Republican committee of Franklin county, at Columbus O., U. S. Senate to investigate the charges against Sen. Payne.

The Washington Post quotes Sen. Miller as saying that in his opinion the Morrison surplus resolution will not be adopted upon by either the committee on Finance or the Senate at this session.

The New York board of aldermen adopted a resolution naming a portion of a street uptown as Hancock Park, in memory of the late Gen. Hancock.

The resolutions of the constitutional convention of Dakota, praying for the admission of South Dakota as a state, were presented in the Senate, and referred to the committee on territories.

The postmaster general has ordered 453 offices to the list of money order offices, the business of that number having increased during the year so as to come with the provisions of the law.

The business failures throughout the country during the last seven days, as reported by telegraph, number for the United States 163, and for Canada 20, as compared with a total of 179 last week.

Dr. Lucien Rose, an electrician, unable to obtain a patent on his telephone in this country, is going to Sweden with it. He claims that it operates easily and satisfactorily through 2,500 miles of wire.

Col. Gilder, of the New York Herald who was about to leave New York in search of the North Pole, is now in jail on a charge of stealing a \$1,000 bond from Miss Sally Adams, the professional swimmer.

Sec. Byard says he is doing all in his power to protect our fishermen in Canadian waters. He has directed Minister Phelps to demand from the British government full satisfaction for all injuries sustained.

The convention between the steel rail manufacturers of England, Belgium and Germany, formed for the purpose of preventing ruinous competition, has expired. It is stated that the convention will not be removed.

It is announced in a New York paper that the skeleton of a man found under a flagging has been identified as that of A. T. Stewart, the merchant prince, whose body was stolen from the grave in 1868, and has never been recovered.

Distribution of the per capita of \$300,000 received by the Cherokees for grazing privileges is now being made under an act of the Cherokee legislature, and to full-blooded Cherokees only. These number 18,319, and the amount due each is \$15.95.

The Cincinnati Enquirer prints a remarkable story of fanaticism. It is charged that about 30 of the most prominent people in the city worship and pay homage to a Mrs. John B. Martin as Christ manifested in the flesh. The publication created a sensation.
