



Railroad Building in South America.

Lucas Bennett, a son of the late B. G. Bennett of this place, who has been absent in South America, principally in Peru, for the past four years, returned last week and has good news to tell. He has secured the right to build a railroad from Callao across the mountains to the interior, the ultimate object being to build a road to the Pacific Coast with the Atlantic through Brazil, and also with the head of navigation on the Amazonian waters. The company referred to is composed of the latter bond holders or holders of the national debt with which Peru found herself weighed down at the close of the Callao war. This debt was principally in the hands of English people, although W. R. Grace & Co. and Drexel, Morgan & Co. of New York were heavy holders. Some concessions made by the government induced the bond holders to organize and accept corporate privileges as an improvement company. By so doing they have proceeded to develop the resources of the country by increasing transportation facilities. To this end they are building a road from Callao across the mountains, a distance of a little more than 100 miles. This is over 24 miles beyond the summit, leaving 75 miles to be completed in order to connect with the head of navigation on the Amazonian waters. The magnitude of the work already done can hardly be conceived. The lowest pass in the Andes to be surmounted, was 12,000 feet above sea level. This was accomplished by the company determined to employ American engineers, owing to their success in dealing with similar enterprises in the construction of this country. It was in this way that Mr. Bennett entered the service and finally rose to the position of chief engineer. Mr. Bennett, through his connection with the administration of the affairs of the company, has by his energy and integrity added much to the confidence of the people of Peru, so necessary to the success of their enterprise. As an example of some of our own, unprincipled men who often swindle the people of this country, we have the following: This was often done, causing the men to quit work and a suspension of the work in consequence. To remedy this the company frequently stepped in and paid the men, securing their confidence and the resumption of work. American rolling stock is preferred on South American roads, owing to its better adaptation to our coming high grades and short curves. English iron is used because it is cheaper than any other. The best materials are used in all the work done by this company. It has been extended already in the work. The most expensive part of the road is new built. Mr. Bennett thinks that the completion of the road referred to, will do much toward the improvement of the country as it will open an important trade route between Europe and the South Pacific.
