

The line mapped out by Mayor Cummins is as follows: Start in the vicinity of Rulo, from there to Fortescue, Fortescue to Paris and on to Chicago, and then to the river, and from there to Oregon, from here to Savannah. The route is a very feasible one, and will pass through the richest farming and fruit growing portion of our county. These parties have an abundance of capital and will likely come here in a short time and look over the route and make a decision as to whether or not they should receive an abundance of encouragement from our citizens.
