

There are many physicians who claim that there is no such thing as appendicitis. This causes an overly anxious exchange to ask: "If this be true what shall we do with those who have died with it?" Well, its rather late to do anything in their cases; but we might compromise and offend no one by declaring "that death resulted from heart failure."

Last week silver dropped to 50 cents an ounce, which makes the value of the silver in a silver dollar just a fraction over 46 cents. In the meantime wheat is steadily advancing in price, thus knocking into a cocked hat the theory of Coin that the price of silver governs the price of wheat. Coin will not be compelled to enlarge his gold coin but he must also revise his wheat-silver theory.

During the American revolution an English magazine published an estimate of the future population of the North American colonies. Placing the population then at 2,000,000 and assuming that it would double itself every twenty-five years, the writer then estimated that in the year 1800 the number would have increased to 64,000,000. This may be taken as a most remarkable prophecy, inasmuch as the census of 1890 fixed the total population at 62,625,200.

The calamity strikers will have to hurry if they expect to get in their shrieks about farm mortgages. Dispatches to that effect Democratic paper, the New York Sun, say that farmers in all parts of the country are rapidly paying off their mortgages indebtedness under the advance in prices of wool, grain, and farm products generally, and that with the probability of good prices of the farm crops now being harvested the indebtedness of the farmers of the country will be greatly reduced during the coming year.

As it was with tin plate so it will be with burlap. Under the new tariff law it is predicted that within five years, mills in this country will be turning out \$2,000,000 worth annually and not a yard will be imported. Not a yard of burlap is made in this country, the world's output coming from Calcutta and Dundee, of which the United States uses one-half, valued at from \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000. Protection for five years will yield the government \$6,000,000 in revenue and establish an industry which would employ many thousands of hands.

The Omaha World-Herald, a Bryan paper which last fall loudly proclaimed that no property could come to this country unless Bryan should be elected and a law allowing the free coinage of silver should be enacted, in a recent issue says: "Things that were as if dead have sprung into life. Business that was declining has begun to experience a revival. Houses that were empty have been filled. Buildings that have been dilapidated have been put to repair. Trade that was dull has been aroused to activity. Citizens who were depressed have become hopeful. The future that was gloomy has become bright."

To the Editor of The Sentinel:—Please state the market value of a piece of gold and also the market value of a pound of silver. What will \$1,000 of such weight buy? KRONBERGER. One pound of gold, Troy weight, is worth \$218, while one pound of silver is worth \$7.20. The coinage value of a pound of gold is \$248, being worth no more after it is coined than in dust or nuggets. The coinage value of a pound of silver in the United States is \$15.45 more than double its market value. It will thus be seen that \$1,000 in gold will weigh a fraction over four pounds, while \$1,000 in silver will weigh a fraction over sixty-four pounds.

The publisher uses one thing to sell and one thing to rent. He has the newspaper to sell and the space in the columns to rent. Can any one inform us why he should be expected to give away either one or the other? He can if he chooses, and he does as a matter of fact, furnish a great deal of space rent free. But it does not follow that he ought to be expected to do so. It ought to be recognized as a contribution, exactly as coffee by a grocer. But strange to say, it is not looked upon in that light at all, yet everybody knows that the existence of a newspaper depends upon the rent of its space and the sale of the paper, as a merchant's success depends on selling his goods instead of giving them away.—Press and Printer.

New Laws in Missouri.

Among the new laws passed by the last session of the Missouri legislature and of more than ordinary interest to the farmer, is the law relating to contagious diseases, (hog cholera) which provides that the owners of swine that die of disease within twenty-four hours after they die by completely burying them up to their feet, or burning them upon the premises where they have died. It shall be the duty of the owner of the swine that may be sick of any fatal disease to notify all persons owning or keeping swine on any adjoining premises of the existence of such disease as soon as the fact is known. If the owner refuses to bury or burn the carcasses it shall be done at his expense, but no such carcass shall be buried in or immediately adjacent to any water course, ravine or gully leading through or into other premises.

If the credible citizens of a county makes affidavit that the father or mother of a child or children are immoral or intemperate, the county court shall award the custody of such child to some other person or non-sectarian institution. Whenever there shall be a poor person apprehended upon the supposition that said poor person is insane the county clerk shall forthwith convene the county court for the purpose of passing upon the insanity of such apprehended person.

Whenever, by reason of sickness, accident or neglect of the county or other prevent ing cause, the judges of the county court of any county shall not be able to hold any regular term, then the Judge of Probate shall hold said term of court. It is punishable by a fine of not less than five or more than twenty dollars to let run at large any deformed, aged blind or infirm domestic animal.

It is also a misdemeanor to exhibit in any tent, booth or theatre any deformed person or beast fowl or reptile or any human being without arms or legs, or any monstrosity. Every person who shall directly sell, give away or otherwise dispose of or deliver any intoxicating liquor in any quantity to any minor without the written permission of the parent, master or guardian of such minor first had, shall be fined not less than forty dollars nor more than two hundred dollars.

Marriages in this state may be solemnized by any judge of a court of record or justice of the peace, or any licensed or ordained preacher of the gospel who is a citizen of the United States. Females over the age of 18 years may be appointed as notary public. Special instructions as to the effects of alcoholic drinks, narcotics and stimulants on the human system shall constitute a part of the course of instruction to be taught in all schools supported wholly or in part by public money, or under state control.

Resources of Missouri.

In 1896 Missouri produced 200,000,000 bushels of corn, 13,000,000 bushels of wheat, 22,000,000 bushels of oats, 3,500,000 tons of hay, 14,000,000 pounds of cotton, 7,000,000 pounds of tobacco, 500,000 bushels of flaxseed and 8,000,000 bushels of potatoes, says the Corn Belt. The estimated annual value of its fruit crop is: Apples, \$10,000,000; strawberries, \$500,000; grapes, \$1,000,000; raspberries, blackberries, peaches and plums and other fruit, \$1,500,000, or a total of \$12,500,000.

The dairy business of the state, exclusive of the investments of the farmers and of their products, and including only the creameries and dairies that have made report, requires for its support the products of 136,000 acres of land, valued at \$4,000,000; it has \$300,000 invested in dairy buildings, owns 30,000 cows valued at \$900,000, and annually produces for market 2,000,000 pounds of butter, 600,000 pounds of cheese and 10,000,000 gallons of milk, a total investment of over \$5,000,000, making gross annual return in dairy products of \$1,500,000.

A review of the agricultural conditions and the productions of Missouri indicates the unlimited possibilities of the state. It has an area of 44,000,000 acres; the largest iron mountain in the world; twenty counties with an unlimited supply of iron; 23,000 square miles of coal area and an annual output of 3,000,000 tons; lead mines operated in twenty-six counties, the most productive single mine in America and a total annual production of 61,100 tons of pig lead. It has also lead in zinc production, with an annual output of 131,000 tons. It has extensive quarries of red and gray granite, red, gray, cream-colored and mottled marble, onyx, limestone and sandstone.

It has the largest stock feeding farm, producing its own grain; the largest nursery, the largest orchard and the largest jack breeding and importing establishment in the world. Among breeds of live stock its improved hogs, cattle, sheep, horses and mules are winners in competition with the best animals in the world and are largely drawn upon by breeders in other states and countries.

Its live stock is enumerated and assessed as follows: Horses, 918,000 head, value \$20,000,000; mules, 231,000 head, value \$7,000,000; cows, 723,000 head, value \$17,000,000; other cattle, 1,688,000 head, value \$32,000,000; sheep, 775,000 head, value \$1,475,000; swine, 3,169,000 head, value \$12,393,000; or a total assessed valuation of \$69,700,000, which is probably about half the real value.

Running Down the Farm.

Any farmer who will wear out his farm does not deserve to own one, and yet thousands are busily engaged in doing that very thing. Poor farm, poor farmer. Run down farm, run down farmer; farm becoming worse every year, farmer getting poorer every year. You can't separate the fortunes of the two. Years ago a farmer wisely tilled but a small portion of his wide domain, and he could wear out one field, clear another, wear that out and take in more new land. That was merely doing the thing on a large scale. These were bad farmers, and those who are doing the same on a smaller scale are no better. A farm properly managed should continually improve. This cannot be done by raising staples and selling them off. Raising and feeding stock and a judicious rotation of crops with green manuring will do the work. Even on our richest Texas lands many fields are being cropped on the degrading plan. It is inseparable from the present tenant system, which is probably the worst in any civilized country. Landlords are chiefly responsible for this state of things, and they are the chief sufferers. Even owners of farm homes need to be reminded of this fatal process of wasting fertility; many of these are working the land without any thought for the years to come.
