Opportunity for Missouri Teachers. The board of curators of the University of Missouri, with a view to broadening and elevating the character of public instruction in this state, has announced a most liberal and promising offer to the teachers of Missouri. It is proposed to give the public instructors a special course of two months, beginning April 15th, tuition free, the only expense involved being that of transportation to Columbia and return and the cost of board during the term. The purpose of this movement is set forth as follows: "First--To draw the university into closer sympathy with the great body of our teachers.

"Second--To promote between it and them the most friendly relations of mutual esteem and benefit. "Third--To make common cause with the teachers in developing and perfecting the public school system. "Fourth--To give tangible evidence of a desire to aid the teachers by means of university extension courses, especially arranged for meeting their wants. These courses are intended to give methods and ideas rather than facts. They do not come into competition with any regular course of study, nor offer students any chance to make up university work; but it is hoped that they will help teachers to better aims and methods, and fit them to become more effective in the classroom."

This course of free instruction is especially advantageous to teachers of the country school. It will not only afford direct instruction--long lines calculated to give the teacher better equipment, but it will suggest to the receptive mind new subjects for personal study and make it acquainted with the most advanced methods of pedagogy. The advantages of the extensive library of the university are not the least of the many considerations.

The spring courses will be followed by twelve weeks of similar instruction, beginning June 1, for which a small tuition will be charged, the two courses affording an unusual opportunity to those engaged in the profession of teaching. This departure should do much to promote educational interests in this state and to foster a still more hearty support for the leading educational institution of Missouri.
