After the Truists.
 Attorney Geo. E. C. Crow is preparing to start a crusade against the trusts in this state under the anti-trust law of 1895, which was sustained by the supreme court this week in a test case brought to ascertain its constitutionality. The law, he says, applies to all other trusts operating in Missouri, just as forcibly as it does to the insurance companies, against which the test case was brought, and Gen. Crow says they will all have to answer. He refuses to outline the policy to be pursued or to state which of the trusts will be attacked first, but says that no time will be lost in beginning the fight. "The law is very sweeping in its character," said Mr. Crow, "and where evidence can be obtained showing the illegal nature of the combination it will be impossible for the trust to escape. The test case was aimed at the weakest point in the law, namely, the section exempting St. Louis and Kansas City, and now that this feature has been struck, a decision in a few days in another test case involving the constitutionality of that part of the law which prohibits the formation of trusts in other parts of the state. The decision of the first case, however, carries the other case with it, and there is no question but that the constitutionality of the whole law will be affirmed. Some of the corporation lawyers expected to find a loophole of escape, through which, by repudiating the action of their agents in entering the trust, the corporations could escape responsibility. But even that has been decided them by the court, which has decided that the action of accredited agents in such matters are binding upon the principals." Gen. Crow declared that the decision of the supreme court was by no means a victory for the insurance companies, as the case was brought simply to test the law.

After the Truists.
 Attorney Geo. E. C. Crow is preparing to start a crusade against the trusts in this state under the anti-trust law of 1895, which was sustained by the supreme court this week in a test case brought to ascertain its constitutionality. The law, he says, applies to all other trusts operating in Missouri, just as forcibly as it does to the insurance companies, against which the test case was brought, and Gen. Crow says they will all have to answer. He refuses to outline the policy to be pursued or to state which of the trusts will be attacked first, but says that no time will be lost in beginning the fight. "The law is very sweeping in its character," said Mr. Crow, "and where evidence can be obtained showing the illegal nature of the combination it will be impossible for the trust to escape. The test case was aimed at the weakest point in the law, namely, the section exempting St. Louis and Kansas City, and now that this feature has been struck, a decision in a few days in another test case involving the constitutionality of that part of the law which prohibits the formation of trusts in other parts of the state. The decision of the first case, however, carries the other case with it, and there is no question but that the constitutionality of the whole law will be affirmed. Some of the corporation lawyers expected to find a loophole of escape, through which, by repudiating the action of their agents in entering the trust, the corporations could escape responsibility. But even that has been decided them by the court, which has decided that the action of accredited agents in such matters are binding upon the principals." Gen. Crow declared that the decision of the supreme court was by no means a victory for the insurance companies, as the case was brought simply to test the law.
