A Trip to Port Arthur Texas.

My sons, William, Robert and family and John Young, of Forbes, boarded the Burlington train on the morning of March 21. P. Moser, the local agent of the Burlington and Gulf R. R., having the territories of Andrew and Holt county, joined us at Annona. We arrived in Kansas City, that evening. On the morning of the 22nd, we took the special train over the Pittsburg & Gulf, consisting of thirteen Pullman sleepers, one diner, and one baggage car, drawn by one of their most powerful engines. We sped along the eastern line of Kansas, and the western line of Missouri, passing Pittsburg, the great coal fields of Kansas, and their smelters and coal shafts looming up on all sides. The next town of importance was Joplin, the great lead and zinc region, a town of about twelve thousand. Passing out of Missouri into Arkansas, we next reached the next town of about four thousand inhabitants, a distance of 280 miles south of Kansas City. This is one of the company's divisions. Passing on south through the great belts of oak and pine timber, seeing many large saw mills and state plants, many of the saw mills having a capacity of 100,000 to 125,000 feet per day, spinning on south near Louisiana, seeing many plantations, and cotton fields. Here we saw cotton bales at nearly all the stations along the line. Arriving at Silvestre on the morning of the 23d. The Third Mo. Regiment band which accompanied us from Kansas City, lined up in front of their magnificent depot, giving the citizens some selections of music, such as "Dixie," "Marching Through Georgia," and other pieces, which was greatly enjoyed by the citizens. From Silvestre we went to a town of about 15,000 located on the coast, which was quite a noted place during our civil war, where so many of the Confederate soldiers were brought to be murdered. After a stop of 40 minutes, we sped on southward, finally reaching the long leafed pine regions, when the train was brought to a stand still, the conductor informing the passengers that the train would stop 15 minutes, giving them an opportunity of going through the saw mill plant. This mill is operated by the P. & G. R. Co. has a capacity of 150,000 feet per day, with planers and dry kilns to handle the same. This certainly was a great treat to the passengers. This alone would have paid for our trip, had we not had other things to see.

Criminal Costs.

The attention of magistrates of the county is called to the following sections of law. If the law were strictly complied with by magistrates requiring persons instituting prosecutions to give bond for costs, it is probable that half of our criminal costs would be avoided.

Section 1401 of Revised Statutes is as follows:

WHEN PROSECUTOR TO PAY.—In all cases, except those in which death or imprisonment in the penitentiary is the sole punishment, where any person shall be committed or recognized to answer for a felony, and no indictment shall be found against such person, the prosecutor, person on whose oath the prosecution was commenced, shall be liable for all the costs incurred in that behalf; and the court shall render judgment against such prosecutor for the same, and in no such case shall the state or county pay such costs. (R. S. 1879, Section 2168.)

Section 1402 is as follows:

WHEN PROSECUTOR TO PAY.—If a person, charged with a felony, not punishable with death or imprisonment in the penitentiary, shall be discharged by the officer taking his examination, or person on whose oath the prosecution was instituted, and the officer taking such examination shall enter judgment against such person for the same, and in no such case shall the state or county pay the costs. (R. S. 1879, Section 2069.)
