Missouri Apples Win.

L. A. Goodman, secretary of the Missouri State Horticultural society, has received a very congratulatory letter from William A. Taylor, of Washington, D. C., who is acting pomologist in the department of agriculture. The Missouri exhibit took first prize in the pomology competition of June 27 at the Paris exposition. This is the fourth first prize won by the Missouri society.

In addition to the award to the society, specimens of all varieties included in the society collection were also included in the general collection of apples of the United States of the crop of 1899, which consisted in this competition of 40 varieties, representing 11 states. This was also awarded a first prize by the jury.

The amount was 4.18 inches.

—Miss Martha Petree will teach in Midland college, Atchison, Kansas, the coming year. The board will find her a strong, capable teacher.


