How to Vote. When the voter presents himself at the polls on November 6th, he will receive seven signed papers, including three slips which will be uniform in width, about three inches, and about one yard in length, an ink quality identical.

So far as this state is concerned, the ballot is a thing of the past. Four years ago the voter received from the judge a sheet as large as a full page of a newspaper.

This year, as two years ago, the voter has something that doesn't require blackboard explanation to protect him from making an idiot of himself.

Receiving one of each of these from the judges, the voter goes into communion with himself within the voting booth. He selects one of the seven and folds it so that the face can not be seen.
