—The biggest taxpayer in the United States is Marshal Field—the Chicago merchant; he is assessed on forty million dollars. A point not to be forgotten is that he is also the biggest advertiser in the United States.

—W. C. Brown, formerly general manager of the Burlington lines in Missouri, with headquarters in St. Joseph, is said to be slated for the presidency of the New York Central and manager of all the Vanderbilt lines, which comprise 24,000 miles of track. The position is said to pay \$100,000 a year.

—The Missouri board of railroad commissioners decided last week in favor of J. A. Harmon, of Browning, Mo., against the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railway company for return passage required by railroad from complainant, who had shipped one carload of hogs from Browning to Kansas City. The complaint was in four separate charges and the total is \$10.95 for fares, which the board orders refunded, and the board also orders the cost of the hearing at Brookfield, which amounted to \$8, refunded. The board finds the defendant guilty of violating Section 1,085 R. S., 1899. The railroads are willing to issue transportation on two cars of stock, but not on one.


