GRANDMOTHER PROUD.

Death of Mother Proud.

Sarah King was born in Ross county, Ohio, March 24, 1812, and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Luella Parker, in Mound City, Tuesday, June 12, 1906, in the 94th year of her age.

Old age and a wasting away of the vital forces were the cause of her death, which came to her as peacefully as though she was sinking to sleep. She had been permitted to pass the allotted time of life by many years, and was nearing the century mark. She was a woman in whom all the virtues which make womanhood respected and admired were prominent. She was a true Christian and noble mother, and has left a family of sons and daughters who show how well she trained them and how her example has made them true men and women.

She was married to John Proud in Ohio, in 1830, and moved to Howard county, Indiana, near the town of Kokomo. There were no railroads, street cars, or automobiles in those days—nor were there any postage stamps or sewing machines, and their nearest trading point at that time was Peru, Ind., sixteen miles away.

While living at Kokomo, the civil war came, and two of her boys, David and Samuel, went forth to battle for their country. David died in the army, at Camp Nelson, Ky., in March, 1862. The latter returned from the army and is still living.

In 1864, Father and Mother Proud, hearing of cheap prairie lands in Missouri, in company with a party of some twenty, set out for this state. They came to St. Joseph and were here met by James Pollock, who had preceded them, and from St. Joseph the entire party came to Holt county, and to Oregon, near which place they bought a farm and all its appurtenances—the old John Edwards farm, now owned by James Curtis, about three miles north of Oregon.

Father and Mother Proud in due time left the farm and came to Oregon, where their son, C. O., had resided for some time. His health began to fail and on December 8, 1885, he died, at the age of 74 years.

Father and Mother Proud were the parents of ten children, five of whom, Timothy H., born in 1836; Samuel W., born in 1844; Mrs. Parker, born in 1855; and Mrs. Alina Spittler, born in 1852; Clark O., born in 1846, survive, all of whom reside in this county, excepting Mrs. Spittler, who resides in Dayton, O., and Timothy, who resides near Fairfax. She has twenty-one grandchildren, thirty great-grandchildren, and one great-grandchild, a son of Mr. Chew, of Iowa.

Following her husband's death, Mrs. Proud moved to Mound City, where she has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Luella Parker, and annually on her birthday, her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, neighbors and friends have made it a joyous occasion, calling upon her, and spending the day with her. Notwithstanding her advanced age, she was free from constitutional affliction, and was only enfeebled by advancing years, having a clear, strong, mental vision and of a joyous, sunny nature.

Grandma Proud has always lived the life of an exemplary Christian, and no doubt is one of the oldest members of the M. E. church, having united with the church in 1826, at the age of 14 years. Her father was a Methodist minister, and thus for 80 years she had been identified with this great religious organization. Although of late years she has, through feeble health, been deprived of the privilege of the public worship, she has held sweet communion with her God at all times, living just on the border land, as it were, hourly expecting the call to step into the promised rest.

Mrs. Proud was the sister of Dr. Reuben King and Bennett King, formerly of this county, both of whom are now dead. She has but one sister now living.

Uncle David Pollock, who is now in his 94th year, Reuben King and Lem Kyger were the heads of the family that accompanied her and husband to this county, and Uncle David is the only surviving member that survives.

Brief funeral services were conducted at 8 a. m., Thursday morning, 14th inst. The remains were brought to this city and funeral services were held from the M. E. church, conducted by her pastor, Rev. Gillies, of Mound City, assisted by Rev. Eneyart.

The illustration accompanying this notice was taken from a photograph made when Mother Proud was 82 years of age, and the little one in the picture is her grandson, Willis Parker, now 16 years of age, who has ever been her boon companion.

But we believe White Cloud has a goodly number of citizens who appreciate such loyalty to her educational interests.

—Mrs. Sarah Colwell died at her home northwest of Maitland at 3 o'clock Sunday morning, June 3, 1906. She had been ill for some time. The funeral took place from the U. B. church at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, Rev. J. W. Roberston officiating, the remains being laid away in the K of P. cemetery. Mrs. Colwell was 71 years of age, being born in Indiana, May 29, 1835. She was married to Henry H. Colwell August 30, 1855, and to this union were 10 children, nine sons and one daughter, eight of whom still survive. They are Mrs. Eliza Tottan, Jesse, James, Frank, Lucian, Will, Perry and Charles. Mrs. Colwell had been a member of the United Brethren church for 25 years, and was universally loved.—Maitland Herald.


