Educational Notes. Most of the schools opened up for the year's work the first Monday, in September, and the outlook for a successful school year is good indeed. A large number of Holt county teachers took work in summer schools and are much better prepared than ever before to do effective work. Rural school courses of study are in the hands of the printers and will be ready for distribution soon. Every teacher should grade her school and leave a record for the teacher who follows. In the absence of county supervision let the teacher make themselves familiar with the course of study of town schools, and try to prepare students to take up the work in the first year of the High school. No Rural teacher should attempt to do any High school work. Some Rural teachers attempt two or three classes that properly belong to the High school, this may be all right if the student goes no further, but should he enter High school that work which he has done cannot be accepted, because of the limited time spent in preparation and recitation. It is, therefore, earnestly desired that teachers of Rural schools attempt nothing above the eighth grade, but do the eight grades well. The text books selected for the schools were the best, in the opinion of the board, to be had, all things considered. It is hoped that all the teachers and boards will comply with the recent law and use these books the present year. The County Teachers' Association will be held this year on October 17, 18 and 19, in Mound City. A splendid program is being arranged and every teacher is expected to be present. Copies of the new school law also lists of the adopted text books are in the hands of the commissioner and may be had by teachers and school officers, for the asking.
