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### THEY GRIND EXCEEDING FINE

The Circuit Court Grinds Out a Big Batch of Cases—Adjournment is Taken a Busy Grand Jury.

There has been something doing at the seat of justice the past two weeks—and the lawyers as well as litigants were kept busy all the time even Saturday night they were kept busy. Judge Ellison is to be complimented for one thing especially—he will make the lawyers hustle and do something when court is grinding—they sometimes find themselves wondering where "they are at," but the court soon locates them, and then they get down to business.

It has been an usually busy court, and many cases have been disposed of, and in addition to the usual grind, a splendid grand jury has occasionally thrown something into the hopper to cause Mr. Prosecutor to look on in amazement—We believe the grand jury of the January 1908 term of our court will go down on the court records as having been one of the very best that has ever been heard from for a number of years. Their labors included the entire time of the first week, and returned to their labors on Monday of this week, and on their adjournment had returned some thirty true bills. They were not of the pyrotechnic sort of men—but of that careful, methodical, conservative make up that must be fully convinced before voting an indictment. With but two exceptions, Messrs. Moore and Weber, the jury was made up of farm ere.

L. I. Moore, the foreman, is a business man, born in Oregon, in March, 1862, and has constantly resided here.

C. B. Griffith, the grand jury's crier, was born in Page county, Virginia, in 1861, and has been a resident of Holt county since 1873, and has been abiding on his present place in Benton township since 1897.

Jacob Hinkle, the spencerian artist for the coterie of inquisitors, is another of the native born, having been born in 1880, and located on his present place in Bigelow township, in 1896.

F. C. Meadows, of Clay township, is a native of Monroe county, Indiana, and reached his 58th mile post September last; came to Holt county in 1865, and has been on his present farm since 1875.

A. G. Weber is a mechanic, and in 1888 he served as Holt's assessor. He was born in Wheeling, West Virginia, in May, 1849, and came to Holt county in 1868. In 1901 he located at Forest City, and represents that township on the grand jury.

William Sims, of Forbes township, was born in Virginia in June, 1865, and located in Forbes township in 1900.

A. A. Wright, of Hickory township, was born in Indiana, in October, 1855. Came to Holt in 1869, and has been living on his present farm for the past 15 years.

Andrew Peters was born in Lincoln township, Holt county, in April, 1859, and has been living there for the past

48 years, and for the past 31 years on his present farm.

Edward Wehrli, of Liberty township, was born in Illinois, September, 1809, and in 1863 came to Holt county. In 1888 he occupied his present farm.

George Swope, of Minton township, was born in Holt county in February, 1852, and has ever been a resident of the county, living on his present farm since 1875.

William Kee, of Nodaway, is the patriarch of the jury, having been born in Pennsylvania in December, 1836. He came to Holt county in 1865, and in 1903 located on his present place.

H. Ohlensalen, represents Union township; he was born in Germany in 1852, and came to Holt county in 1871, locating on his present farm in 1898.

A sudden halt came to the deliberations of the grand jury on Tuesday, caused by the illness of foreman L. I. Moore, and juror Wm. Kee, of Nodaway township. Their places were filled by C. L. Ryhill and George Watson. Geo. Swope was chosen as foreman, and immediately after the dinner hour they began their labors again. On Wednesday they adjourned, having returned some thirty-five true bills, and having been in session nine days, one of the longest sessions ever held in this county by a grand jury. By reason of their work the court has cited some of the parties caught in the grand jury's dragnet to appear Monday next, which means there will be some more court next week.

The regular panel of petit jurors was relieved from duty on Wednesday and a new venire of 24 jurors took their places without any delay whatever.

Al Duncan, Carl Spicer, Will Flemming, of Andrew county were here attending court. Attorneys B. R. Martin, of Maryville, P. Breit, of Savannah, and Senator Wilson, of Platte City, have been in cases before the court this week.

Frank Freytag, of the St. Joseph Observer was here Wednesday, and looked in on Judge Ellison's mill, and tried to learn something about the Big Lake, whether or no its water is supplied by the Missouri river.

Since our issue of last week, the following cases have been called and disposed of in some manner:

State vs. Wm. Crawford, unlawful sale of liquor; continued.

State vs. Levi Cabbage. Defendant was charged before Esquire Hopkins, justice of the peace at Craig, with the seduction of Alice Illsley in the fall of 1905. A preliminary was had and the defendant bound over to the circuit court. After two years' struggle in our circuit court, a jury at this term, said "not guilty," and thus ends one of Union township's scandals.

State vs. Russel Devoras; defendant is charged with committing a crime of "rape" upon Armina Vandiver, a 13-year old girl, residing near Forbes, the child becoming a mother ere she was 14 years old. The case was called, but the defendant took a continuance.

State vs. James Hamilton; unlawful sale of liquor. Fined \$200 and paroled

on payment of \$10.

State vs. Ernie Craig; unlawful sale of liquor. Forfeiture of bond taken.

State vs. Everett Dodge; defendant was charged with forging the name of John Ramsay to a check for \$12. He was arrested on trying to negotiate the check with Tommie Teare and others in Forest City, during the late fall. He pleaded guilty and was given five years in the penitentiary.

State vs. William Criss. The defendant is a negro and was in the employ of Dr. Simmons, of this city, in the spring of 1907; he suddenly disappeared, so did the Doctor's fine shot gun and case and meerschaum pipe, and Mrs. S's gold watch. He was arrested in St. Joseph in September, and his case being called, he pleaded guilty, and the court said, "five years."

There were three cases against Strouher Bragg, charging him with practicing veterinary without a license; he was fined \$50 in each case, but paroled on payment of costs.

Wm. J. Fields was charged by the state with practicing veterinary without the necessary state credentials. A jury said "Uncle Billy" was not guilty.

William Fattie was charged with carrying concealed weapons. Defendant previously had been an inmate at the St. Joseph asylum and had been discharged, and he returned to Forbes township, and carried a dangerous revolver and made threats. His case was given to a jury, and believing him of unsound mind, gave a verdict of not guilty. The court ordered him into the safe keeping of the sheriff, until a meeting of the county court, which body will no doubt order him to be returned to the asylum.

Orley Williams and H. Davidson, negroes, were charged with burglary and larceny—breaking into a car of merchandise at Forbes, a few weeks prior to the meeting of court. They each pleaded guilty, and were given five years each in the penitentiary.

Fitzmaurice vs. Fitzmaurice is a case which grows out of the peculiar way in which Patrick Fitzmaurice deeded his land to his children some years ago, not making specific provision for the ditch tax and leaving some amount of the crop to be paid to the remainder man, Timothy, who was in possession. The case was continued.

Gossett vs. Williams. Plaintiff sues James Williams, former sheriff on his bond, for selling some personal property out of a building in Forbes, the sheriff claiming he set the property out under a writ of execution in an injunction suit, which had been previously tried. The plaintiff filed affidavit for a change of venue.

R. H. Lunsford vs. Squaw Creek Drainage District, No. 1. There were several of these suits; they all asked for damages against the district for so constructing its ditch and drain that certain lands were overflowed and plaintiffs lost their crops. Besides Mr. Lunsford, Chas. J. Bruntmeyer, Gilbert Murray and John A. Carson have similar suits filed. These cases were all continued.

Arthur O. Markt, of Maitland, brought suit against the C. B. & Q. railroad, charging the destruction of his property, the lighting plant there, was caused by sparks from defendant's locomotive. The case, however, was dismissed.

Marion C. Odell vs. Thomas W. Strickler. This was a suit for damages growing out of the breach of promise suit of his daughter, Nora vs. Strickler. Plaintiff has leave to deposit \$50 in lieu of cost bond. Defendant has leave to file answer 50 days before next term.

Solomon W. Campbell was granted a divorce from his wife, Charlotte M.

Nodaway Drainage District, No. 1, vs. Huldah Fellers and others. The commissioners ask for a change of boundary to which Caroline Spicer, David E. Fields and Ralph Meyer filed objections.

Thomas Teare vs. Frederick V. Zook. This was a suit to quiet title. Ivan Blair was named as guardian adlitem for the defendant.

George W. Adkins vs. Mary A. Hopkins was a suit to quiet title. R. B. Bridgeman was appointed guardian adlitem for Portia Hopkins.

State vs. Steve Hayes; felonious assault. Parole continued.

State vs. John Pyle. Parole continued.

State vs. Alma Means. Parole continued.

Fisher vs. Pendergust was a suit for wages. The case was continued.

State ex-rel. Holt County vs. Enoch A. Welty. This was a suit brought by the county to recover from his bondsmen as late county clerk, some \$5,000 of fees claimed to have been retained by Mr. Welty, during the last four years of his term, and never accounted for. The issue in this case is as to whether the bondsmen are to pay what was missing more than three years back. The case has been in court since the last August term; and a special hearing was had on September 19th. Evidence was

introduced at this term, and as yet the arguments have not yet been made. Messrs. Blair and Richards represented the bondsmen and Messrs. Dungan and Price, the county.

Pearl Headley vs. Ezekiel Headley; damages. Motion for cost bond sustained.

Hamilton Brown Shoe Co. vs. M. Y. Martin; appeal from J. P. court. Plaintiff accepts judgment as confessed by defendant for \$18 00.

Lou Rasic vs. George C. Rasic; divorce. Decree for plaintiff.

Solomon W. Campbell vs. Charlotte Campbell. Divorce. Decree for plaintiff.

W. F. Davis vs. John Foster. This was an attachment suit for rent on the old Kramer farm below Curzon now owned by Mr. Davis. Judgment for plaintiff on attachment, on plea in abatement.

Henry G. Beilhen vs. John Gilligan Bridge Company. This was an attachment suit on account of furnishing supplies, casting and labor performed by plaintiff. Plaintiff obtained judgment for \$521 67.

The cases against John Iden and others on the charge of unlawful fishing, came to a sudden end Wednesday, by a plea of guilty and a fine of \$50 being assessed. A parole was granted on payment of costs.

Junius Donnel vs. John F. Miller; replevin. Judgment for the plaintiff—the plaintiff had the right to the property under mortgage.

The State against Ben. Austin on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses was ordered stricken from the docket. It was alleged that Austin secured the signatures of parties to a note for \$5,000 under false pretenses, and the securities had to pay the note. Mr. Austin's many friends will be glad to learn of his complete exoneration. He was for a number of years the assistant cashier of the Forest City bank, and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his fellow citizens, and which has not been lessened by this unfortunate affair. He is now engaged in business at Granite, Oregon, and we are glad to learn is prospering.

### Disgraceful Proceedings.

The Maitland Herald of last week, gave particulars of one of the most disgraceful proceedings that has ever blotted the fair name of Holt county, and we do hope for the sake of the citizenship of our sister city and the good name of our county, that a complete investigation may remove much of the stain, and it may prove not so bad as first reported.

The Herald says "that a pack of lewd and immoral men, both married and unmarried, taking advantage of a weak point in a woman's character lured her from her home in the absence of her husband, and plied her with drink—not on one occasion, but twice was this infamy perpetrated. Whiskey was obtained which was drugged with cocaine. The husband of the woman formed a searching party, and about midnight, Saturday night last, she was found lying in an unconscious condition on the railroad track near the city's prison. One of the execrable creatures was discovered and given a pair of black eyes, and another was recognized making his escape near the electric light plant. The one with the black eyes wears the badge of his infamy."

The circuit court being in session, and a grand jury also at work, the matter was called to their attention, and on investigation, a warrant was ordered for Don Weller and Bones Roberts; Mr. Weller appeared and gave bond, but Roberts left for parts unknown, before the sheriff could interview him.

—Sam. Nowland and family, who for fifty years have been residing in our county, take their departure this week, for Pawnee City, Nebraska, where he will spend the rest of his days at his ease. We are sorry to lose you, Sam, but we wish it may ever be well with you and yours.

—Secretary of State Swanger has issued a letter to the various county clerks, correcting an erroneous impression that many seems to have obtained from the late issue of his Blue Book, regarding the sheriff's term of office. Many seems to have gotten the idea that the present sheriffs would hold their office for four years by virtue of their election in 1906. This is a mistake, the secretary of state says, his term will be for four years upon his election in 1908.

—County Clerk Zeller has received blank forms from the State Board of Agriculture, by which any township, school district, community, or body of citizens may make request to the county court for a part of the county's proportionate part of moneys available for that county from the state permanent road improvement fund. They are only forms of agreement and not requisitions. The court has discretion in the disposal of the county's part of this fund. This money is only obtainable where permanent improvements are to be made.

### THE STORK'S ANNUAL VISITS.

The Sentinel's Record of Births in Holt County During the Year 1907.

In Kansas City, Kansas, recently, a day laborer's family was increased by the birth of triplets. The triplicate parents already had six children, but the father, an industrious, hard-working man, took this splendid view of the situation: "Yes, it will be a little more difficult than we had figured on, but I'll hustle a little harder and do my best to take care of all of them properly."

Almost on the same day a noted club woman in Chicago was giving a learned sociological lecture on the matter of race suicide. In which she declared that it was a crime for parents to bring children into the world whom they could not properly support. Few people realize to their fullest extent the possibilities of "hustling a little harder." Most of us stop short of that. We imagine we are at the limit of our ability long before we are fully there. Many do not put forth any really serious effort at all, and society should take upon itself to aid and persuade every man to do his duty in fulfilling the obligations he has taken on himself in setting up a home. The very beasts are more humane than some men. They follow their instincts and the law of their natures to the limit.

It was a delegate from Pike county to the Joplin convention of Missouri Federation of Women's clubs who could hear the stork's wings on the rising storm. She feared foreign domination through suppression of the birth rate of Americans, but mentioned, in what appears to have been only an incidental way, that during a recent visit to Oklahoma, she was surprised and delighted to find that it was impossible to go anywhere without meeting children, and plenty of them. That the stork has been and is continually rooting in Holt county, is the glad tidings The Sentinel brings to the people of our splendid county.

It has been computed that about 30,000,000 babies are born into the world each year. The rate of production is, therefore, about 70 per minute, or more than one alighting of the stork for every tick of the clock.

The births in Holt county for the year 1907 is larger than any year since 1863, and has been exceeded but five times within the past thirteen years. During these thirteen years we have a record of 2,991 births and 1,889 marriages. The smallest number of births reported was 173 during the year 1894.

But three times since 1865 have the girl births exceeded the males—1863, 1895 and 1907 and the totals during this period show 1,424 boys to 1,457 girls.

The largest number of births for the year just closed, occurred in the month of September, 29; the smallest in April, 9.

During the year 1907 the stork visited 199 homes, leaving 98 boys and 101 girls. During the last month of the year there were 13 girls to 5 boys born; and during September 13 boys and 16 girls came into this good old world.

The first birth reported for the year was in the form of a New Year's gift, from Mrs. Walter Armentrout on January 1st, and was a son. The last birth was on the last day of the year, a girl to Wm. Sharp and wife, Ed. Dwyer and T. W. Huston were each given a Christmas gift in the form of a baby girl each, by their respective wives.

The first pair of twins born was to Mr. and Mrs. M. O. Patterson, and was a pair of boys, February 2d. The last pair, girls, October 18, to Bert Dreher and wife. There were seven pair of twins born during the year, which breaks the record—the next largest was 6 pair, born in 1900. But twice since 1865 has a year passed that no twins were born in our county—these were in 1886 and 1901, and during this period 37 pair of twins have been born.
