The bunch averaged 1,370 pounds, of which 400 had been taken on during the five months they had been on full feed. They were three-year-olds. The same day F. B. Strickler took to Kansas City 20 head, also Short-horns and Herefords, which averaged 1,330 pounds. These also were three-year-olds. Mr. Miles is feeding hogs for shipment about January 1. Mr. Miles realized on his cattle 86 per cent. as ready for the abattoir. Mr. Strickler's cattle were bought as feeders by an Illinois man who paid \$5.90 per cwt. for them. They were rangy in frame and in perfect condition, and will be made prime heavies for the Chicago February market.—Craig Leader.

In 1858 he opened a big store in Rock Port in connection with his brother and here he was married to Miss Sue Dozer. He then opened a store at Glenwood, Iowa. In 1862 the store was removed to Nebraska City. He was the father of 12 children, six of whom are living. His wife died 12 years ago. We glean the foregoing from the Omaha Bee. 
