General Information:

ELECTRICITY.—The entire park as well as large tent will be lighted with electric lights.

Groceries and all other supplies may be ordered by telephone and will be delivered free on the ground.

SPECIAL POLICE will carefully guard the grounds both day and night. You will be as safe as in your own home.

The grounds will be patrolled at six o'clock each morning and all will be required to present tickets good for that day.

A **BUREAU OF INFORMATION** will be located on the grounds. Go there to make inquiries and you will receive prompt and courteous treatment.

TELEPHONE.—Local and long distance telephone service can be secured on the grounds, over the Home, Farmers' Mutual, Bell and Independent lines.

A **CHECK ROOM** will be provided at the Bureau of Information, where small packages, such as valises, umbrellas, lunch baskets, etc., may be checked for safe.

MAIL.—We receive six mails daily, and mail addressed in care of Oregon Chautauqua Association will be delivered at the Bureau of Information. Mail left there will be posted.

BOARD AND LODGING may be prepared on the grounds or at the hotels in the city. A dining hall and refreshment stand will be maintained on the ground. First-class meals will be served at reasonable prices.

CAMPERS' HOUR.—A bell will be rung at half past eleven each night, at which signal all parties on the ground will either leave or retire to their tents. Parties neglecting to do this will be interviewed by the night watch, who will take their names and report them to the committee.
