

Oregon Wins the Second.

Oregon defeated Rockport here, June 23, in the second of a series by a score of 1 to 0. It was one of the best and fastest games played upon the local diamond for many a day, no two teams being as evenly matched before. It was a veritable pitchers' battle between Charlesworth, of Rockport, and Dodge, of Oregon, Charlesworth letting the locals down with a no-hit game, losing on account of costly errors. On the other hand Dodge for the locals had excellent control and pitched winning ball throughout the game, allowing but two scattered hits. The feature of the game were the fielding of Moore and Strickler for the locals and Biggerstaff, of Rockport, also Pa Swan's electrifying one hand catch of Charlesworth's hard hit in the sixth.

5th Oregon—Strickler flew out to Brown. Roberts fouled to Morarity. Dodge rolled to Murphy. No runs.
6th Rockport—Biggerstaff grounded out Hinde to Zeller. Charlesworth flew out to Swan. Holton struck out. No runs.
6th Oregon—Swan reached first on error. Zeller sacrificed Charlesworth to Murphy. Springer struck out. Swan caught at third Musser to Morarity. No runs.
7th Rockport—Brown flew out to Swan. Murphy grounded out Moore to Zeller. Parker flew out to Roberts. No runs.
7th Oregon—Maxwell popped to Morarity. Moore fouled to Morarity. Hinde popped to Holton. No runs.
8th Rockport—Morarity grounded out Dodge to Zeller. Musser grounded out Dodge to Zeller. Odell grounded out Strickler to Zeller. No runs.
8th Oregon—Strickler flew out to Odell. Roberts reached first on Morarity's error. Dodge popped to Charlesworth. Swan drew a pass. Zeller reached first on Brown's error scoring Roberts. Springer rolled to Murphy. One run.

Oregon defeated the fast Weigles, of St. Joseph, at Forest City, Sunday, June 26, by a score of 5 to 3. It was a good game, considering the condition of the diamond, it being in no shape to play upon. The out field was ankle deep with mud and water, while the diamond was rough after a severe dragging. Errors and wild throws were frequent on the part of the St. Joseph team, while the locals put up a fair fielding game, but lacked their old-time pep and ginger. Hill and Dodge both pitched good ball, but errors behind Hill, coupled with timely hits, lost his game.
