 The value of each warranty transaction was \$3,324. The average value in 1910 was \$3,500.

The average of each trust deed filed was \$2,300. That of 1910 was \$2,478. The total number of instruments filed were: Warranty and quit claims, 533; trust deeds, 377; chattel mortgages, 635; marriage licenses, 114; total, 1,459.

The heaviest land deal during the year was that of W. C. Stevenson to W. H. Richards, \$35,000.

One-third of the total value of the warranty transactions were filed during the month of March.

The largest amount of bank deposits at the publishing of the official statements was at the close of business in March, 1911, \$1,772,731. The largest amount on deposit was in February, 1910, \$1,843,700.
