



The Only Adjustable Door



- 1 Unobstructed continuous opening, 22 inches wide, makes it possible to shove enclage out instead of pitching it up two or three feet.
- 2 On account of fastener being entirely on the door, doors can be left in the opening at any height, merely pushed up and out of the way and always where they belong.
- 3 Instead of retilting doors, a few turns of nut here and door front is adjusted to the doors.
- 4 Every hoop on side can be tightened 12 inches while standing on ladder formed by fastener.
- 5 The fastener makes a substantial ladder right under opening, rounds, 15 1/2 inches apart, stand out 6 inches from the door, and are 14 inches wide.
