—Prof. A. G. Stanley returned last Saturday morning from Warrensburg, Mo., where he attended the summer school at the State Normal. While there Prof. Stanley took two courses in English history, one course in algebra and two courses in pedagogy.

—Misses Elsie and Goldie Crow, Addie and Joe Morris, Jean and Josephine Wilson and Matilda Selkman returned from Maryville, Mo., the latter part of last week. They attended the State Normal summer school there, and all of the young ladies with the exception of Miss Addie Morris will teach this term.

—Mr. R. C. Hatswell, hay king No. 2, was down from Red Oak, Iowa, several days last week looking over the hay situation. Mr. Hatswell thinks now that he will be able to cut his hay on the east side of the big ditch within a week, and that the prospects now are that he will not be able to cut the 200 acres on the west side of the ditch.

he takes a shovel with him and when he comes to a bad hole in the road he gets out with his shovel and throws in a little dirt from the side of the road. This is an excellent idea and one that should be practiced by every one in the community.

—Mr. Dave Romine, Mr. R. C. Glenn, of Mound City, and Mr. A. H. Bailey, of Oregon, Mo., commissioners who were appointed by Judge A. D. Burnes to assess the damages for the additional five acres consolidated district, No. 2, desires to secure, were here Wednesday appraising the pieces of property owned by Mrs. Orwick, Mrs. Graham and Mr. R. C. Hatswell.

—Work on the new school house is going along in good shape this week. The roof is being put on, the furnaces have been set, and a man is here from Kansas City installing the toilet system and an electrician from St. Joseph is putting in the wires for the electric lights. A force of men is expected the middle of the week to begin lathing and with favorable weather the building will be entirely enclosed this week.

Mr. Oakerson went through the building thoroughly and was very well pleased with the building, he also made the statement that the school board was to make an effort to secure the additional five acres of land for school purposes and to secure a house for the professor of our schools to live in on the five acres. Mr. Oakerson said the new building would be approved when finished, by the state officials, and if the board was successful in securing the additional ground there would be no question about our state aid of \$2,000.

Mound City Takes Defeat.


