

Back to the Treasury.

Twenty thousand dollars of the \$150,000 appropriated by the Missouri legislature for an adequate representation at the Panama-Pacific Exposition remain unexpended, and will revert to the state treasury.

The furniture and equipment of the Missouri building will be transferred to a new state tuberculosis sanitarium at Mount Vernon, Mo.

Missouri exhibitors received the following horticultural awards at the exposition:

Medal of honor for deciduous fruit. Silver medal for preserved fruits in jars.

Bronz medal for black walnuts. Bronz medal for hickory nuts.

In addition, Missourians received twenty gold medals, twenty-four silver medals, forty bronze medals and sixteen honorable mentions.

Long-Lived Bulgarians.

Bulgarians have a reputation for longevity. They boast of possessing more centenarians than any other people in Europe. Among these "the oldest woman in the world," Mrs. Baba Vasilka, who is, or was quite lately, still living at her native village of Havelisko, which she has never left. She was born of peasant parents in May, 1784, and there is no doubt about her age because the record of her baptism is preserved at a neighboring monastery. According to the custom of a country where women are employed on most kinds of manual labor, Mrs. Vasilka worked in the fields for more than 100 years. When she was born Bulgaria was merely a province of Turkey.—THE BITS.
