

From P. M. Zook.

Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 3, 1915.
OREGON SENTINEL:—Leaving Salt Lake City up the Salt Lake valley for three hundred miles—a beautiful farming country, then we struck the sandy desert for one hundred miles, nothing but sage brush and cedar bushes, then we came to civilization again—some beautiful towns, Victorville, Colton, Santa Fe, San Bernardino, River Side, Ontario, Verwood, a distance of four hundred miles through hundreds of acres of orange, lemon, date, fig, prune and olive orchards, etc. This brings us up to Los Angeles, a city of 400,000 people, a city full of business of all kinds a distance of seven hundred miles from Salt Lake City; then from Los Angeles to Pasadena, a distance of 10 miles where I found my son Henry, located North Pasadena, a population of about 20,000—South Pasadena, 20,000; North and East Pasadena, says against the largest chain of mountains in the west, being eleven miles high, with an observatory on top, which has been building six years, and will take years yet to complete. Pasadena is not a common city, and has no factories. All large hotels have been closed since last May and will open up again the 15th of December.

Pasadena and Los Angeles have a system of street cars, and automobiles that run back and forth between the two cities, each making 72 trips every 24 hours daily. The railroads run up the main streets and the alleys, besides thousands of all kinds and shapes of vehicles, making a noise day and night like a storm, and a cyclone, the heavy loaded railroad trains shake the whole city and make the doors rattle, yet they make a great ado about the chickens crowing, disturbing the peace—the dogs can bark and the cats fight, but the poor little rooster's head must come off. There is an evil existing here in both cities that this government should not allow—the Mexicans and the Greeks and Italians are here without citizenship by the hundreds, as laborers and all kinds of gamblers for making money and working for half what our citizens get. The money they make is sent back to their country, the Mexicans send their money to Mexico to shoot the very man that is hiring him in this country. This government should not allow any foreigner the privilege of working or stopping on the American soil two days without taking out his citizenship papers. Los Angeles is 20 miles from the coast. There are several flourishing cities opposite on the coast.

The weather is warm and dry through the day—have to pull off my coats. The grocers' stores are full of all kinds of garden vegetables—but little seed and coal used here. My best wishes to all. THE SENTINEL, Toros, and old friends in Oregon and Holt county.
