He Comes Back.

Carl W. Bose, who in the spring of 1918 had charge of the 7th and 8th grades of our public school, but was called to the colors, and had to resign, came in last Friday for a short visit with friends here and his former students, with whom he became greatly attached, and they to him.

Mr. Bose being a resident of Graham, Nodaway county, was called from that county, and like thousands of others was anxious to answer the call.

He was sent to Camp Dodge, Iowa, for training, and was made a first-class private, and assigned to the 351st Infantry, 88th Division, went overseas, and while he did not get a chance to go over the top, his experiences, he says, were sufficient to last him the rest of his days. At the time of the signing of the armistice his division was going into position to be ready for the contemplated attack on the great fortress of Metz.

He is looking the very picture of health, and while he got hungry and lousy at times he enjoyed the great discipline and physical help that comes to the soldier. There were no fascinations in France for him. Still primitive in every way, with low moral ideas, and lack in educational ideals—in fact, their ideals if they have any are of the lowest. There is no comparison to be made with the good old United States, and he is simply delighted to get back home.

He is far from pleased with delay in the closing up with peace terms with the enemy, and thinks these should have been closed up before any consideration should have been given to the league of nations—by this delay Germany has been able to gain much.

On his return and discharge he went to Graham for a brief visit with his father and sisters, and then here, and from here he went to Wellington, Kansas, to see his wife, having been married while at Camp Dodge, on July 4, to a Miss Edith Callahan, of Wellington. At the close of his visit with his wife he will take a summer course at the Maryville Teachers' College, in order to complete his course and obtain his B. S. degree.

A Regrettable Oversight.

We wish we were an infallible being, then we would never be called down for an omission or error. It is regrettable that people cannot look upon the newspaper man as being somewhat human, and being such will err at times.

Last week we took great pleasure in presenting a half-tone and favorable mention of our former Oregon lad, now Captain Charles Howell, who went overseas as a member of the medical department of the aviation corps, but we spoiled it, not intentionally, however, but by one of those embarrassing oversights in failing to mention the most important feature of the Captain's military experience—that of having been awarded the "Croix de Guerre," the highest recognition by the French government for valorous conduct under fire and for heroic deeds. This is an honor that has come to few, considering the number of men engaged, and it is the only case, we believe, of a former Oregon and Holt county boy being thus honored, and while he is doubtless proud of this recognition of his bravery by the French government, may we not as Holt county people also be proud of the recognition?
