**Personal and Otherwise**

—Movies will be on at the Royal, Friday and Saturday nights of this week, Oct. 17-18, and Tuesday night of next week, Oct. 21.

—Advices are to the effect that on Monday of this week, Oct. 13, a motor truck line was inaugurated between Lincoln, Neb., Wichita and Hutchinson, Kansas, and St. Joseph, for service between those cities in freight and express transportation. The concern is to be capitalized for \$1,000,000. It is the intention to install other lines to radiate out of these places.

—Joshua A. Graham, supervisor of the census for this district, is getting things in shape to be ready for his part of the job when the time comes to begin. He desires those who would have places under him to send in their names to him as soon as possible. An examination for the positions will be held the latter part of this month.

—The Northwest Missouri Teachers' Association will meet in Maryville, October 23, 24 and 25. The sessions will be held at the state teachers' college, and many educators from this part of the state are expected to be present. This is one of the six divisions of the State Teachers' Association, and an enrollment fee of \$1.00 will admit to the district association and the state association.

**Outline of Plans for Sale of Government Supplies.**

Pursuant to instructions from Director of Storage, Washington, D. C., retail stores with mail order departments were established and opened for sales direct to the general public of this zone, September 23th.

Sales to postmasters, municipalities, etc., under former plans were discontinued September 20th.

Attached price list applies to all articles sold through mail order department. The price of articles is exactly the same to individuals outside of St. Louis as it is to residents of St. Louis, as the mail order department pays postage necessary to delivery and pays insurance on all orders of valuation exceeding two dollars.

No reclaimed articles are to be sold through the mail order department, as it is desired that customers buying reclaimed articles may have an opportunity to see exactly what they are buying.

Mail orders must be accompanied by post office money order, certified check or cashier's check covering the value of the articles ordered. No other form of payment will be accepted. Mail orders must be plainly addressed, Zone Supply Officer, St. Louis, Mo., Mail Order Department.

If mail order is received for supplies of which stock is exhausted money will be returned or the articles available will be forwarded and the money value of unfilled part of order refunded.

Price lists may be changed or revised from time to time upon notification from Washington and corrections sent to mayors, postmasters and newspapers.

Mail orders may be made for less than case lots, but should not be made in quantities in excess of reasonable family needs.

As the object of this method of disposal of surplus Government supplies is to place them in the hands of the public at the lowest price possible and to effect as wide a distribution as possible at minimum price, the Government reserves the option to limit quantities to be sold to any individuals or to decline to sell if it appears goods are to be resold or are bought for purposes other than consumption of families, in homes, or for use of the needy.

Hotels, restaurants, messes conducted for profit, etc., are therefore excluded from the privilege of purchase.

Mail orders will be limited to one case or sack shown by price lists. Canned meats may be ordered in larger quantities.



