It Was a Success.

The Sentinel of last week announced a special service at the U. M. E. church, on Sunday, Sept. 5th, with the promise of a display of the things that God gave us through Mother earth, and those of us who were privileged to attend that service, were sorely surprised and blessed, and glad to have been there. The pastor gave us three texts—Matthew 14:20; James 1:11, and John 1:13—showing us how God cares for us, and that He gives us enough and to spare, and for us to gather up the fragments. His display was placed on a large table in front of the pulpit, slightly elevated, so that one could see the complete display during the sermon. A large watermelon, when he bought, and a plate of oats and one of wheat, which were donated to him, were the center-piece, while in artistic manner such things as he grew in his own garden on vines and trees were placed.

There was a jar of beans and a jar of cherries, while ears of corn formed a border, between which red apples and tomatoes alternated, while peaches, pears, white and purple grapes, squashes and cucumbers, a little heap of potatoes, a head of cabbage, formed bright spots around the great center-piece, the watermelon—beets with the tops formed corner pieces. All so arranged as to produce a picture of real things God gives His children to use for their own bodies and to spare—gather up the crumbs—and told them that on the last pew were empty fruit jars, which were sent up from the Deaconess Home in Kansas City, Kansas, asking the sisters to take some and fill as many bottles as possible, and return them and on his return from conference he would barrel them and send them to the Home, from whence the Deaconesses would distribute to such needy poor as they find in the cities when on their rounds of service.

It was an inspirational sermon, in word and picture and display, and will long be remembered by those who were there. X. N.
