THE BELGIUM STORY TOLD

All cargoes destined for relief in Belgium came to Rotterdam and from there are transferred to canal boats for transportation to the points where the same are to be turned over to the persons for whom they are intended. The name of the Commission for Relief in Belgium, therefore, is really a grain shipping office. At this moment the canal ships are unloading cargoes consisting entirely of food and clothing destined to the Commission, and in this month of January their total will and fall short of \$9,000,000,000 cases of 50 tons each, 40 cases of 40 cases. It is some business.

A most useful adjunct to the Commission here is the Rockefellers Foundation. In addition to buying and sending over five full ship loads of food the Foundation is doing the work and paying the expenses of despatching the clothing which has come to us shipped from America. All the cases are taken to one or the other of two great warehouses and sent over to the Rockefellers Foundation. Mr. Charles Jenkins, director of these houses opened, and their accumulated upon tables, where they are sorted and packed into boxes and numbered and labeled so that when they go to Brussels the cost of distribution, it is known exactly what each box contains. For the work of sorting and packing Belgian refugees are employed, both men and women, and it can well be said that they are more than glad to do the job. The women are paid \$1.50 a week and in addition are allowed to select from among the garments they handle one garment of their choice each week. The men are paid \$4.50 a week.

In all such cases a good many stories appear in these boxes which strike one curiously. I noticed some above sets this afternoon and there is quite an assortment of dress suits, undershirts, the worse for wear. But for the greater proportion of the cases are admirably chosen warm clothing, bedding, shoes, and hundreds of boxes have come filled with new cloth to be given to those who will make it up into such garments as they need.

**WHERE THERE WAS NO
ROOM FOR HATE**

The following is taken from a French officer's letter to his fiancee published in the New York Call:

There are two other men lying near me, and I do not think there is much hope for them, either. One is an officer of a Scottish regiment, and the other is a private in the Ulans. They were struck down after me, and when I came to myself, I found them hanging over me, rendering first aid.

The Britisher was pouring water down my throat from his flask, while the German was endeavoring to stanch my wound with an antiseptic preparation served out to them by their medical corps. The Highlander had one of his legs shattered, and the German had several pieces of shrapnel buried in his side.

In spite of their own sufferings, they were trying to help me, and when I was fully conscious again the German gave us a morphine injection and took one himself. His medical corps had also provided him with the injection and the needle, together with written instructions for its use.

After the infection, feeling wonderfully at ease, we spoke of the lives we had lived before the war. We all spoke English, and we talked of the world we had left at home. Both the German and the Britisher had only been married a year. * * * I was scared, and I suppose the other did, too. We had fought one another at all. I looked at the Highlander, who was falling asleep, exhausted, and in spite of his drawn face, and mustained uniform, he looked the embodiment of freedom. Then I thought of the tricolor of France and all that France had done for liberty. Then I watched the German who had ceased to speak. He had taken a prayer book from his knapsack and was trying to read a service for soldiers wounded in battle.

**MANY CHICAGO CHILDREN
GO HUNGRY TO SCHOOL**

A frightful condition is exposed in the Chicago statements showing the extent of underfeeding of school children in that city. The facts and figures were collected under supervision of the city health department and may therefore be assumed to be reliable. So far as the investigation has gone, mainly, it is inferred, in schools where the worst might well be feared, from 10 to 25 per cent of the children have been found to be undernourished. Pathetic stories are told in the report of statements made by little ones, under tactful and sympathetic questioning, of their daily fare. Many do not go home for the noon recess, and being without luncheon, or the means of getting it, they go hungry.
