The museum car called "Seeing Mexico" will be on exhibit in St. Joseph next Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May, 17-20, stationed on a sidetrack of the St. Joseph & Grand Island. The car will be open from 9 o'clock each morning until 10 o'clock at night. It contains all kinds of real articles from Old Mexico—agricultural, industrial and mineral; much fancy work of Mexican women to interest ladies, and school work by Mexican pupils to entertain children, as well as Mexican monkeys, talking parrot, etc. The car was loaded by the Mexican government, under Madero, but is in charge of Americans.


