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

SHRINES AND CHURCHES OF QUEBEC TELL PROVINCE'S EARLY HISTORY



Quebec, through her shrines and churches, proclaims that she was born and bred in the fold of the Roman Catholic Church. Today, nearly three centuries since the Cross and Lilies of France were planted on the hills above the St. Lawrence, the religious institutions then founded still flourish. Soft-footed nuns, cowled monks and flat-hatted priests are met on every hand as they go about their duties. Always the cross is in evidence—crude wayside shrines along the country roads and great golden crosses upon city spires.

In a square among the little houses of Lower Town stands the unpretentious church of Notre Dame des Victoires, near the site where stood Champlain's house. A beautiful custom is maintained by the Franciscan Sisters' Convent in its office of perpetual adoration with two white robed nuns ever kneeling before the altar. The most widely known Quebec shrine is that of Ste. Anne de Beaupre in the little town of the same name, connected with Quebec City by electric tram and motorway. This shrine, built in fulfillment of a vow made in 1650 by storm-harassed sailors to Ste. Anne, the mother of the Virgin, is

famed for its cures. Each summer pilgrims by thousands, from far and near, kneel before the miracle-working shrine. Montreal, too, has its celebrated churches and shrines. Its Cathedral of Notre Dame, a \$6,000,000 edifice, contains a bronze St. Peter which pilgrims travel far to kiss. Notre Dame Bon Secours has a unique chapel built above its roof, a replica of a miraculous structure at Loretto on the Adriatic, while the Virgin in Our Lady of Lourdes Church is ingeniously illuminated and the shrine under the church is fitted like that of the famous Grotto at Lourdes in France. At Ste. Anne's on the western end of the island of Montreal, stands an ancient edifice, once the westernmost church in Canada, at whose altar knelt explorers and voyageurs ere committing themselves to the perils of the wilderness beyond.

our president will recall him immediately. Protests against Mr. Harvey are coming in from patriotic men and women throughout the nation. I sincerely hope that the president will heed these protests."

War Mothers Denounce Harvey Senator McKellar read into the Record the following protest from American War Mothers: "Whereas the Senate of the United States of America, on April 2, 1917, declared that we were in a state of war; "Whereas we believed that it was through no fear of loss, no greed for gain, but for a great ideal, for the saving of the nations and the freedom of the world, that we submitted to the sacrifice of our sons and countrymen;

"Therefore we, the Pennsylvania State Chapter of the National American War Mothers, assembled in convention in Philadelphia, declare we have read with the utmost abhorrence the words reported to have been spoken by George Harvey, ambassador to England. Those words are an insult to everything the women of America hold dear. "They defame every man and woman who made sacrifices during the war in the hope of hastening the coming of peace and all it implies.

"Our beloved sons—soldiers, sailors and marines—fought, suffered, and died believing they were crusaders in a great cause. The words of Mr. Harvey lead us to believe that they fought in vain. "Our dead soldiers can not repudiate this insult; it remains for the mothers whose sons made the sacrifice to do so. "Therefore we, the mothers of sons who were in the army and navy, and president of the United States to repudiate this insult to the country and to remove the stain which the words of Mr. Harvey have placed upon the honored dead of the World War, who died for the ideals of the United States of America."

Another protest from the women is as follows: "The Women's Pro-League Council, composed of Republican women, at a meeting on May 25, directed that— "A solemn protest against such statements and such policies contained in Ambassador Harvey's speech be sent immediately to the president and the secretary of state, as a gross misrepresentation of America's war aims and ideals, and a betrayal of

millions of American voters for whom the League of Nations . . . was the great issue of the campaign, and who voted for Mr. Harding in the belief that his election would assure such a league."

Appalling Growth of Taxation The growing burden of taxation was shown by Senator Hitchcock (Dem., Neb.) in discussing the Naval Bill recently passed. He cited the following appalling figures: "In 1913 the per capita tax due to appropriations made by Congress was \$4.75 per person in the United States. If the bills as now proposed are passed that per capita tax in the United States during the coming year will approximate \$48. I saw an article not long ago in a New York paper declaring that the burden of taxation on the people of the United States, taking the state, local and national taxes into account, was something like \$750 per family. That is an understatement. It is practically \$50 per person, or \$750 per family, which we in the Congress of the United States levy. That takes no account of the various state taxes."

In the matter of government indebtedness, he said: "The people of the United States who in 1913 bore a governmental indebtedness (state, municipal and national) of \$50 per person, now bear a governmental indebtedness of \$300 per person."

Walking Backward in Democratic Tracks Representative Stevenson (Dem., S. C.) in a recent speech gave these specific instances wherein the present Republican administration has walked backward in the tracks of the Democratic administration: "Well, we were to have all of our foreign policies reversed. Let us see what we have done up to this time about reversing the foreign policy of this government. On the question and rights of this nation in Mesopotamia the policy of the former administration is being absolutely followed by the present administration. As to the question of the rights and policy of this nation in the Island of Yap our present administration is standing squarely in the tracks made by the administration that preceded it. On the question of our dealings with Russia the present administration has not veered an iota from the administration that was before it. On the question of cable control, this House unanimously passed a resolution to follow the leadership of the Democratic administration on that very important question. On the question of the treaty with Colombia, whereby we re-establish relations with the government of the United States of Co-

lombia, the administration sent the treaty negotiated in 1916 by a Democratic administration. The present administration has followed the policy of the Wilson administration in the matter of backing up the banks of this country in making a loan to China.

"It was one of the crying shames of the country, according to Republicans, that General Pershing, instead of General Wood, was sent to France. Yet we find the present administration has endorsed the proposition by making General Pershing the chief of staff of this country instead of the great and heroic General Wood. (Applause.)

"Judge Hughes, when a candidate for president in 1915, denounced the appointment of E. Lester Jones as head of the Geodetic Survey and called him an incompetent 'horse doctor.' Mr. Harding reappointed this 'horse doctor' in March, with the statement that his services were indispensable. "President Wilson put post offices under the civil service, and Harding has followed suit with a scheme that the politicians hope to use to cover the spoils system which they hope to run. Indeed, the Republican administration thus far is walking mostly in the tracks of the Democratic administration, but they appear to be walking backward and stumbling occasionally."

Peace—But Under Versailles Treaty It seems that the much denounced Treaty of Versailles is to be the basis of peace between the United States and Germany, after all. Chairman Porter of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, has rewritten the Knox resolution, which now declares the state of war at an end, cutting out the proposed repeal of the war declaration, provided all of our rights and interests are protected as stipulated in the Treaty of Versailles and the treaty with Austria, invoking the protection and benefits of the treaty rejected by the Republican Senate.
