THE TARIFF BILL IS GIVING THEM TROUBLE

passed up altogether or at least until the disarmament conference is over. This economic monstrosity, known as the Fordney Tariff bill, has been riddled by House and Senate Republicans as well as Democrats until it will no more hold water than a sieve, and yet enough blind partisans were found in the House to pass it. It is not satisfactory to anyone except the profiteering big manufacturers. Bankers and other business men oppose it and the greatest merchant perhaps in the world, the head of Marshall Field & Co., Chicago, has shown that the "American valuation" clause would destroy what little foreign trade there is left in merchandise.

A Tremendous Power
Among the big measures yet to be acted upon is the war loan funding bill introduced by Senator Penrose, which empowers the secretary of the treasury to do anything he pleases with the \$10,000,000,000 foreign loans and to be the sole judge of the transactions he may enter into in funding the debt. This, as has been pointed out by Senator McKellar (Dem., Tenn.), and Senator Underwood, the Democratic Senate leader, is an unprecedented and unwarranted grant of power which no one man ought to have or ought to be willing to accept. It is the most sinister and dangerous measure ever introduced in any session of Congress and is sure to result in acrimonious debate, but the Republicans are in an arbitrary, stiff-necked mood and ready and willing to employ the steam roller whenever it becomes necessary to override the minority.

The railroad funding bill, the Panama tolls bill and the maternity bill are all measures which await action and are provocative of debate. The separate peace treaty with Germany, which is sure to create divisions in the votes of both parties, will have precedence probably, and it is predicted that it will be fought as bitterly by the Bitter-enders as was the treaty of Versailles.

In the meantime, six million persons are idle and the American troops are still on the Rhine.

It would seem, therefore, that we are yet a long way from normalcy.

Silk Hosiery and Unemployment
Following its announcement that 5,735,000 persons were out of employment and supplying the figures apparently to justify the statement, the Department of Labor is now busy trying to explain that there cannot possibly be that many persons out of work, principally because some persons employed during the war in war work and now without an occupation could not be properly classified as persons subject to employment. Secretary Davis also finds consolation in the statement that there are 12,000,000 who are still at work.

As an evidence that the unemployed are being absorbed by industry, he says:

"But one must have his head very much in the air these days not to notice the growing prevalence of silk hosiery and the use of silks in general."

The fact remains that idle men are offering to sell themselves into employment for board and lodging as slaves were sold on the auction block while others are being chased from the benches in public parks which they had pre-empted as beds.

The flippant remark of the secretary about the prevalence of silk hosiery could not have been inspired by these pathetic scenes.

The business of the Department of Labor is to give facts and figures concerning employment and unemployment without exaggeration and certainly not to confuse the public with explanations or even apologies that have no relevancy to actual conditions.

Everyone without regard to party is desirous of relieving deplorable unemployment conditions and the best way to do so is first to know the actual facts and then face them courageously and sensibly.

A Department of Labor that guesses at or juggles statistics relating to labor or attempts to conceal the facts is worse than useless, and is obstructive to proper remedial measures.

Untaxing Rich—Overtaxing Poor
When the tax bill passed the House by a vote of 237 to 177, the Democrats to recommit the bill for revision. Here are the reasons as given by two western representatives:

From speech of Representative Schall (Rep., Minn.):

"The test should be, ability to bear the burden. The man who is able should pay. The man who has profited most should hand over in proportion. Spending should not be the basis for tax. Earnings are the only just basis. The present tax bill is fashioned to lay the heaviest burden on the backs of those least able to bear it. Think of the number of new millionaires, those who stayed at home and profited. Think of the

profits—\$9, 100, even 1,000 per cent—made at the cost of our necessity, at the price of our boys' blood and agony, and now, forsooth, the surtax, the excess-profits tax, must be cut down.

"I shall vote to recommit the bill, with instructions to report it back, minus the repeal of surtaxes."

"The tax should be made enforceable. A definite and certain per cent should be laid upon income and excess profits. . . . Abolish non-taxable securities. Force the money out of its hiding place. Place the burden of tax where it belongs. This is what should have been done. . . ."

"The test of the integrity of this bill is that the tax on the pay envelope is raised from 25 per cent to over 50 per cent, while the surtax is reduced from 65 per cent to 32 per cent, and the excess-profits tax is abolished altogether. The principle of progressive tax was right, produced goodly revenue, even with the tax dodging. Why yield to political expediency and abolish it? I cannot see wherein any such action is defensible. One more argument has been handed to the Democrats on a silver platter. The level of constructive statesmanship is very low when it passes out a bill like this for the relief of the country."

Trusts That Profit by Tax Bill
(From speech of Representative Voight by W. W. Mumford, Deputy Clerk.)

"It is claimed that this bill will bring about a saving in taxation of seven or eight hundred million dollars, but the question that I am interested in is, whose money is going to be saved?

"The bill, no doubt, will save that amount to the millionaire class and not for the great mass of the people. During the past five years the corporations of the United States have made net profits of \$47,000,000,000, and after paying all taxes they had left net profits of thirty-eight billions. Four-fifths of this money was made by about 10,000 corporations, although over 300,000 corporations made income-tax returns. About \$19,000,000,000 was made by a thousand corporations, in round numbers, such as the Steel Trust, the Powder Trust, the Standard Oil, the Bethlehem Steel, the Coal Trust, the Woolen Trust, the Packer Trust, and so forth. The Steel Trust made over five hundred millions in 1918. When we repeal the excess-profits tax we are relieving a small number of monster profiteering corporations making anywhere from 15 to 50 per cent, placing a heavier weight on thousands and thousands of smaller corporations which make only a reasonable profit. This course violates the first principle of taxation."

Truth About Administration
The entire contents of the forthcoming issue of the Searchlight, the independent monthly at Washington, to appear September 30, will be devoted to "The Truth About This Administration." It controverts by facts and figures the alleged "savings" of this administration and shows that President Harding's predicted "savings" of \$350,000,000 on the basis of alleged "savings" in the shipping board would develop into a deficit of something like \$1,750,000,000.

It also shows that by a "Juggling Joker" in the second deficiency bill military appropriations made during this session are to be charged back to the preceding Congress. All other appropriations currently made are to be charged ahead to the next session of Congress after this. From advance sheets it may be predicted that this is the most comprehensive and important revelation made of how government is conducted under this administration.
