

THE NATIONAL NEGRO EDUCATION CONGRESS to be held in Oklahoma City July 7, 8, 9 promises to be the greatest gathering of intellectual and progressive Negroes ever held in this country and under the leadership of its aggressive President, J. Silas Harris, A. M., it will undoubtedly make history for the race.

Attorney L. A. Knox, in a letter to the Journal replying to a suggestion from Prof. Greenwood that one hundred or more regiments of Negro soldiers be sent to Mexico, said some very pertinent things, but in stating that the K. P. drill corps were the only available forces for such an emergency overlooked the Knights Templar, the Patriarchs, the Palatine Guards and many other organizations of equal efficiency and hesitancy.

It might also be noted that some one is always on hand to pick out the Negro's usefulness and availability when the country is confronted with peril. When times are prosperous and things are rosy the black man comes in for little or no consideration. The door of hope which war offers is all right in its way, but the times of peace could afford a much better portal if the same consideration were shown. Why not give the Negro consideration all the time?

The corner lunch wagon used to be a real convenience to those who for various reasons resorted to them of evenings. Now they have degenerated in most instances to a positive menace. The quality of food has grown shamefully bad and the service quite unsanitary. All this added to the stale beer of late hour frequenters is bound to have a visible effect upon both physical and moral health. The term "dog wagon" is aptly chosen.
