GOVERNMENT CAMPAIGN TO INCREASE PRODUCTION OF POULTRY.

As part of the government's plan to increase the production of poultry and eggs the famous Federal Poultry Exhibit in charge of experts from the Department of Agriculture will be shipped direct from Washington and displayed here in Convention Hall from November 26th to December 2d inclusive. This exhibit occupies 2,500 square feet of floor space. It will be part of the Heart-of-America Poultry Exposition at which thousands of prize winning "birds" of all varieties will be entered from every part of the United States. The Government's exhibit and the poultry husbandmen in charge will demonstrate the most practical and profitable ways to breed poultry and produce eggs according to the experience of the nation's experts on record in Washington. It will be shown how you can materially lower your living costs and at the same time conserve the country's supply of expensive beef and pork by raising chickens and gathering eggs for your own table. Eggs and poultry meat contain more food value for the money now than beef and pork. An enormous extra production of these delicacies will go far toward augmenting the work of the United States Food Administration. Eggs and chickens are classed with fish, fruits and vegetables as local foods, which you are expected to consume in preference to less perishable staples, which are needed for shipping to our soldiers and sailors and Allies abroad.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY, Chester, Pa.

Before a crowd of one thousand people, chiefly Alumni and friends of the two colleges, Howard University bowed to Lincoln University in an exciting football game with a score of 6-0. The only score of the game came in the first half second quarter with but ten seconds to play. Batey and Archer quickly completed a forward pass, the latter with a bounding leap grabbed the ball and dropped in his tracks for a touchdown. Neither team could score after that, although time and again Lincoln made first downs with 25 yards of Howard's goal only to be held for downs. The frantic holding of the Howard team in their own territory was a feature of the game. The spectacular play of the game came in the second half when Coleman of Howard intercepted a forward pass and made a dash from the center of the field for goal. He had an apparently clear field and the Howardies were wild with joy but Captain Barber of Lincoln coming seemingly from nowhere overtook and downed him on his 20-yard line. Lincoln quickly held them for downs and the game ended with both teams fighting hard for midfield. Both teams have been hit hard by the draft and officers training camp and several of the last year's stars were missing. Lincoln invaded Hampton November 16 and took them by storm.
