SOUTHERN OKLAHOMA NEGRO HUNDRED YEARS OF AGE.

Standing with an erectness that reminds one of the proverbial Indian, with a face the color of polished mahogany, wreathed in a perpetual smile, displaying teeth that would cause a movie star to turn ashen with envy, his head thatched with wool as white as the driven snow, there resides in Southern Oklahoma's largest city, Alec Taylor, who is probably the oldest colored citizen in this section of the state. So long has Uncle Alec lived in this city that he has become a fixture among the white folks from whom he serves in various capacities. So active is he in the performance of his work that age has made no material impression upon him and few suspect that his one hundredth birthday is approaching. Born on an Alabama plantation in 1820, it will be seen that he is now in his one hundredth year.
