POLITICAL.

Ex-Congressman Outwater says that the harmony among Ohio democrats is surprising.

Congressman Berry has come out as a candidate against Blackburn for the senate in Kentucky.

Senator Vest emphatically declares that he is in favor of the free coinage of silver at the rate of 16 to 1.

Ex-Congressman J. DeWitt Warren, of New York, thinks that inaction on the currency question by the incoming congress will make Cleveland's nomination inevitable.

J. M. Atherton, a member of the resolutions committee of the Kentucky democratic convention, has written a long open letter to P. Wat Hardin, the democratic candidate for governor, denouncing him for his stand on the democratic money platform and declaring that he will work against Hardin as well as all his friends.

The New Jersey democrats nominated Chancellor A. E. McGill for governor.

The platform was then read and adopted, as follows:

"The democratic party of New Jersey, in convention assembled, declares:

"That we reaffirm the democratic national platform adopted in Chicago in 1892, and cordially endorse the administration of President Cleveland, with whose determination to protect the people of this country from the evils ever attendant upon the debasement of the national currency we are in most earnest sympathy. We congratulate the people upon the revival of prosperity everywhere evident in our land, and we assert that the industrial depression with which we have been afflicted during the past three years is chargeable to national legislation enacted by the republican party. The purchase of silver to be stored in the treasury, and the enactment of unjust tariff laws, enriching a few favorites by the oppression of millions of consumers, were the main causes of the paralysis of our markets. That paralysis, with an empty national treasury, were the legacies received from a republican administration. The battle against a system formed in violation of self-evident laws of political economy has been won. Every struggle against entrenched wrong is attended by privation and suffering, but these are never endured in vain. The lesson of the cause and effect has been thoroughly learned and we are willing to abide by the decision of an intelligent people who are now entering upon a period of prosperity that will prove both substantial and enduring."

The platform "denounces as maliciously false the allegations of the republican state platform that the democrats had conducted the government of New Jersey in a dishonest and extravagant manner. Attention is called to the fact that the state is out of debt and for twelve years not a dollar of the state tax has been levied upon the property of private owners.

A constitutional amendment was advocated to render impossible the legalization of gambling in any form.

The republican party of New Jersey and other states is charged with having dealt with the question of betting on horse races by trickery and deceit.

Pledges are given that the democrats will guard the water supply of the state from corporate interests, and that the views of organized labor will be properly considered.

The New York democratic convention was marked by a dispute between Tammany and the state democracy for representation as regular delegates. Tammany won and the opposing faction was headed by ex-Secretary Fairchild, W. H. Fickland and W. E. Harnsberger. Cleveland's appointees for the supreme bench, left the convention in disgust. This ticket was nominated: Secretary of State—Horatio C. King, of Kings.

State Treasurer—DeWitt Clinton Dew, of Schoharie.

Attorney General—Norton Chase, of Albany.

Comptroller—J. B. Judson, of Fulton.

State Engineer—Russell B. Stuart, of Oneida.

Associate Judge of the Court of Appeals—John D. Teller, of Cayuga.

The following platform was adopted:

The democratic party of the State of New York, by its delegates in convention assembled, adopts these declarations of principles:

We believe in, first, home rule: The first essential condition of good municipal government; strict control of local expenditures; a low tax rate.

Second—Economy in public expense; no public money for private purposes or political jobs; strict audit of official expenditures; a low tax rate.

Third—Honesty in public office; no tainted legislation; no corrupt traffic in legislation; clean men and true agents.

Fourth—Equal and honest enforcement of all laws; a proper observation of a day of rest and an orderly Sunday; modifications or repeal of laws unsupported by public opinion; recognition of the fundamental American principle of freedom of conscience; home rule in action, as well as in other matters, within reasonable

GENERAL NEWS.

Secretary Morton has decided to fire all special agents of the agricultural department doing work in Europe.

Wife of the American vice consul at Cairo, Egypt, has been honored by the Turkish Sultan with the order of "Cheftak."

The courts have decided that where a mail contractor sublets his contract the government has nothing to do with the subcontractor.

It is announced that the Illinois Central railroad will use electricity in its suburban service as soon as the change in equipment can be effected.

Colonel Ben C. Allen, aged 87, died at his home in Harrodsburg, Kentucky. He had been in office as county clerk for more than fifty years. He was the oldest officeholder in the state, and was the democratic nominee to succeed himself as county clerk.

Colonel W. C. Jones, ex-United States marshal, and for many years chairman of the Kansas democratic state central committee, was thrown from a cart at Iola, Kansas, by a runaway horse and instantly killed. His horse took fright and ran away, throwing him against a tree in such a way as to break one leg and crush the skull.

The widow of General George Crook, the famous Indian fighter, died at Oakland, Md., at her country place, "Crook Crest," this morning. Mrs. Crook was Miss Mary Daily before her marriage to General Crook. The latter died four years ago. Mrs. Crook's remains will rest beside those of her husband at Arlington Cemetery, Washington, D. C.

Rev. Dr. Talmage, of Brooklyn, has accepted the call to be pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Washington. This decision was communicated by him to the special committee of elders, deacons and trustees. Dr. Talmage is to be co-pastor of the church, of equal authority with Dr. Sunderland, and probably will preach one-half of the sermons, beginning Sunday evening, October 27.

The president, by an executive order, has extended the civil service system, in a modified form, to all consular officers whose compensation directly and through fees ranges from \$1,000 to \$2,500. This includes about one-half of the total number who receive more than \$1,000. This change has been gained by reviving in substance an old order of 1878. Vacancies in the service will be filled hereafter by transfer or promotion, by appointment of qualified persons formerly in the employ of the state department and by appointment of persons selected by the president after passing a noncompetitive examination.

Consul General Max Judd, of Vienna, has forwarded to the department of state a report on the grain crop of the world for 1895, compiled from the report of the annual international fair which Mr. Judd commends as trustworthy. The abstract furnished by Mr. Judd shows that the wheat, rye, barley and oat crops of Europe are somewhat below the average, while corn is exceedingly promising, and it is expected that the yield will be one-half again as large this year as it has been on an average for ten years. Canada shows an increase of about 8,000,000 meter centners in wheat, while India shows a loss of about double that quantity—both as compared with 1894. Most of the Russian provinces indicate an increase in wheat and rye. The Austria-Hungary wheat crop is poor in quality and less in quantity than usual. A lighter wheat crop is also indicated in the United States. The French crop is estimated at 98 per cent; rye at 105; oats at 95 per cent of the average. The wheat crop of Great Britain and Ireland is put down as poor and is estimated at from 40 to 50 per cent of the average. The English barley crop will be better than the wheat crop, but the quality will be poor. England will export considerable wheat. It is anticipated that the loss on wheat in India and the United States will be compensated for by the gain in Canada and Russia and that taking this crop throughout the world, the result for the year will be about equal to the average season.

The Irish National League in session in Chicago adopted this declaration of principles:

"The people of Ireland are a sovereign people. Ireland is by nature separate from every other country, and liberty is the birthright of her people. Ireland was known throughout Europe as a nation long before the dawn of Christianity and was the home of civilization while England was still barbarous. England's claims to authority in Ireland originated in force, and have been maintained by corruption and coercion;

MISSOURI NEWS.

Dallas has been voted against a new jail and stock law.

Two O. & N. City firms scattered \$80,000 among the farmers of Schuyler and Adams counties for timber seed.

The engine of the electric light plant at St. Louis has arrived, and the lights are expected to be in operation by October 15.

The Missouri Grand Lodge of the state will meet at Jefferson City in October. The visiting lodges, over six hundred in number, will send three delegates.

The W. D. Lee farm of 900 acres in Nodaway county, recently sold for \$100,000, indicating that Missouri is rich in every section, is a notable fact of history that has been noted by the people of the state.

The town of Oage City was laid out at the junction of the Oage and Missouri rivers.

The large passing factory at La Plata was burned to the ground last Friday night, resulting in a loss of about \$12,000. The loss was total as there was not a dollar of insurance on the building or its contents.

The Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad company has bought of the Union News Company the eating houses at Dallas, Hillsboro and Smithville. It will build others at Sedalia, Farwas and Franklin Junction.

The old settlers of Atchison county, or those who have resided therein for thirty years, will meet at a log cabin in the fair grounds at Rock Port, Thursday, October 10, for the purpose of forming an old settlers' association.

The latest story concerning the amount of territory secured by a recent survey of the line between Iowa and Missouri is that the survey will result in the latter securing only a meager addition—a few rods, the length of three miles.

Miss Elizabeth Gentry, daughter of Dick Gentry, until recently chief engineer of the Kansas City, Pittsburg & Gulf road, lost \$700 worth of diamond rings Saturday night on a Kansas City street car. She removed the rings to put on a glove. When she reached her destination the rings could not be found.

St. Louis doctors are puzzled over a woman who is turning to stone. She is the wife of Jacob Rawak, a tobacco dealer and capitalist, and is 40 years of age. Ossification set in August last. Her entire right arm, right bosom and a portion of her back has turned hard as stone. Her arm is a little larger than its normal size and is slightly bent. In color it is pure white, and cannot be moved. The doctors say they can do nothing for her.

James A. Spurlock, the head of the Morgan county bar, died at his residence in Versailles in his 70th year after a painful illness. Judge Spurlock was born in Tennessee and received his legal education there. He moved to Versailles in 1864, and was actively engaged in law practice until a few months before his death. He was well-known as a lawyer on law questions and also theological subjects, and his books had a wide circulation. The deceased leaves five sons and five daughters. Among the latter is Mrs. Dr. A. R. Kleffer, of St. Louis.

Captain Henry McPherson, the projector of the Nevada & Eldorado, was at Nevada recently and had a charter for the road forwarded to Jefferson City. The new road is named the Nevada & Eldorado Springs railway and is capitalized for \$800,000. It will extend from Nevada to Eldorado, a distance of about nineteen miles. The directors are W. P. Orms, of Eldorado; Harry C. Moore, of Nevada; W. A. McPherson, of Boonville; W. B. Gibson, of Cooper county; and H. McPherson, of Boonville. Captain McPherson said that work would begin on the road at Eldorado October 1, and that work would be commenced at Nevada as soon as the town raises a bonus of \$15,000. Up to this time about \$12,000 has subscribed.

Disbarment proceedings were begun in the Chillicothe circuit court against Charles A. Loomis, member of the law firm of Davis, Loomis & Davis, and once a republican candidate for congress. It is charged by H. W. McClintock that Loomis tried to induce him to commit perjury in a suit for \$25. The charge is based on the following letter:
