## Accidentally Killed.

Will Maurer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Maurer and a member of Maurer Bros. Bakers & Confectioners was accidentally killed last Thursday morning on their farm just south of the city. Young Maurer with Jas. Scifers, who lives on the place, were engaged in taking down and removing some water tanks left by the Coal Company on the land, which the brothers had recently bought, when in moving some of the supports the whole thing gave way and fell on him in such a way as to crush his skull and breast, killing him instantly.

The news soon spread to the city and produced quite a sensation. The whole town was shocked at the sadness and suddenness of the calamity that should befall one so young and the sympathy of the whole community went out to the bereaved family.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. W. B. Chancellor and the Modern Woodmen from the home on Friday afternoon and the body laid to rest in Greenlawn cemetery. The deceased was one of three most highly respected and enterprising brothers, and the death of such a young man is a great loss to the community.

## L. Johannes Dead

Leonard Johannes, a pioneer citizen of Rich Hill, died in this city at his home in the southern part of the city Monday evening, in the 68th year of his age.

Some days ago Mr. Johannes took a severe cold that resulted in pneumonia and caused his death. He came to Rich Hill with the Johannes & Sons' hardware store in 1881, and for many years was connected with that firm and J. L. Minor's establishment. He was a soldier during the war and drew a pension as such. He is survived by his wife and eight children and some grand-children. The funeral will take place this afternoon, Rev. W. B. Chancellor, of the Presbyterian church, will preach the funeral at the home and the burial will be in Green Lawn cemetery. Thus another old soldier has answered the last roll call.

## Miss Barbara Miller.

Miss Barbara Miller, sister to Mrs. R. H. Main, Mrs. R. A. Alger and Mr. Sam Miller, died at the home of Mrs. Main last Friday morning, after a long siege of illness caused by cancer of the stomach. She was about 65 years of age and a faithful member of the Christian church.

## County Court Proceedings.

Court met pursuant to adjournment. Present: R. F. Harper, Presiding Judge; A. D. Hyde and Estes Smith, Associate Judges; Chas. F. Board, Sheriff and John F. Herrell, Clerk.

Bridge Commissioner ordered to make estimate for steel bridge over Marias des Cygnes at site of wire bridge near water works.

John F. Herrell presents his quarterly and annual report, which is approved.

T. K. Lisle, Recorder, presents his annual report of fees, which is by the court approved. Ordered that Dr. Renick be and is hereby appointed county physician for two years from March 1, 1907.

C. M. Barkley presents his quarterly statement—approved. Geo. Pollock was again appointed as janitor at the court house.

Dr. T. C. Boulware was appointed physician of the county board of health.

The bond of J. A. Silvers, probate judge, and C. G. Weeks, county clerk, were approved.

Ordered that the Drainage District bonds from No. 711 to 149 being thirty bonds \$15,000 be cancelled and retired.

Warrants on the various funds to the amount of \$770.06 were ordered drawn.

The school loan of W. A. Goulet was approved to the amount of \$200.

The bond of the Missouri State Bank for \$75,000 was examined and approved by the court. The bond was to secure them as depositors for River Drainage District funds.

The bond of the Farmer's Bank for \$60,000 as depository of River Drainage Funds was also accepted and approved. S. T. Broadbush was appointed

by the court as deputy county clerk.

## City Council Proceedings.

Rich Hill, Mo., Jan. 8, 1907.

City Council met in regular session and was called to order by H. W. Lancaster, Mayor, all members of the board being present. Minutes of the last meeting read and approved.

Communication from Little & Hayes was read. It pertained to the cancellation of a \$1,000 4 per cent bond. Letter filed.

City officers filed their reports for December, 1906.

Ordinance No. 306 was read concerning the licensing, taxing and regulating of occupations, trades and business. The ordinance levied a license tax to be charged and collected on traveling stores and auction stores, and stipulating the following amounts to be charged: Traveling store license per week \$5.00, per month \$15.00, per six months \$60.00, per year \$100.00. The following licenses were charged for auction stores, per day, \$2.50, per week, \$8.00; per month, \$15.00; per three months, \$35.00; per six months \$60.00; per year, \$100.00. The ordinance was read in detail and passed in regular form, approved and signed.

Bills to the amount of \$518.93 were allowed. By motion Mayor was authorized to order warrant drawn on sinking fund to the amount of \$1000 to take up one out standing city bond.

Under the head of new business the matter of a drilled well for water supply was taken up, and after discussion the Mayor appointed the board of aldermen with the city attorney to such action in the matter as they deemed practicable.

There being no further business, the board adjourned.
