Judge Wofford Dead. Judge John W Wofford of the criminal court, died in Kausas City recentty at the age of 69. His allmont was stomach trouble. He had been afflicted with it for a dozen years. For six months he had suffered greatly from it and while he often inelsted on altting as judge it was apparent to his friends that he was ill and should have been at home. He would not admit that he was sick and when asked about it would declare that he felt well or at least was morely undergoing a temporary spell of indigestion. John W. Wofford was born in Habersham county, Ga., August 14, 1837. He was of Scotch-Irish parentage. At the beginning of the war he was married to Miss Cornella Trescot, of Charleston, S. C. He enrolled with Phillips Legion, composed of infantry and cavalry, and which was afterward disbanded. He remained with the cavalry and was later liettenant adjutant. He was in Lee's army under command of George William T. Wofford, of Georgia and was wounded three times; slightly at Sharpsburg, and in a skirmish; dangerously at North Anna Anna river. He was in the battles of Sharpsburg, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Spotisylvania, Gettysburg the Wilderness and North Anna river, He came to Kansas City in 1877 and became associated in public affairs with Dr. Morrison, Munford, then editor of the old Kansas City Times. In 1890 he formed a law partnership with C. H. Nearing, still of the Kansas City bar, and in 1892 was appointed to succeed Judge H. P. White of the Jackson county criminal court, who and threshing. My wheat totaled 9,280 bushels and my cats

If you remember I pointed out to you a half section lying just west of our house and joining my upper quarter on the south, which I said I should have in order to make one of the best farms in western Canada. I am very glad to be able to tell you that I now own that half section. My ambitton now is to be able to market 20,000 bushels of wheat next year. If some of those good, honest Hoosiers could have been with me during the last two weeks and could have seen the golden grain rushing down the spout into my wagon and then could have seen it in great piles in my granaries, I feel sure they would have been forced to acknowledge there is no better farming country in the world than this. I may just say that I have done all my farming with eight head of horses and one hired man except during harvest my neighbor that the Hooslers, when once "woke up," can raise grain equal to the best Minnesota farmers.
